
From the Rabbi's desk

Shalom,

As I write this article, I still haven't built my sukkah. The High Holidays, while introspective and uplifting, can also be a little exhausting (especially for clergy!). And so, there is a little bit of relief, for we begin an entire Jewish month without a single Jewish holiday in it. It is called "mar" Cheshvan, or sad/bitter Cheshvan. Of course, that really isn't true—each week we celebrate Shabbat, our holiest of holidays.

Once again, we roll the Torah back to the beginning—*Bereisheet* and start a new cycle of Torah. Each Shabbat we learn all over again. As Ben Bag-Bag said in Pirkei Avot, "Turn it, Turn it, (Torah) for everything is in it." Ben Bag-Bag is basically saying that every time we read Torah, we can learn something new from it. Moishe was an elderly, very poor but pious and devout Jew. He prayed multiple times daily and did his very best to obey all of God's commandments. One day, while praying, he told God that he had tried very hard to do what was right throughout his life. Would it be too much to ask that God let him win the lottery?

The next morning, while praying, Moishe asked God "what about the lottery?" Suddenly, he heard a deep, low voice..." Moishe....Moishe." Startled, Moishe said "God, is that you?" The reply came..." Yes Moishe, it's Me." Enthralled, Moishe cried "God, what about the lottery?" To which God replied "Moishe, meet me halfway...buy a ticket!"

At this point, you're probably saying to yourself "the Cantor should stick to singing and forego the comedy." Perhaps you're right, but I'm trying to make a point at this crucial time in our country's history. To say the least, we are living in confusing, scary and troubled times. Stunningly, OVER 33% OF ELIGIBLE VOTERS DID NOT VOTE IN THE 2020 PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION. Yet, I'm sure that many of those non-voters on all points of the political spectrum complained about the results. If you don't vote, don't complain.

Years ago, one of the popular mottos of the New York Lottery program was "You've got to be in it to win it." That's it in a nutshell. If you want to complain, if you want to criticize, if you want to analyze, fine. But...VOTE.

Just like our old friend Moishe, the poor but pious, meet us halfway, buy a ticket! Your ticket is your exercised right to vote. Please honor our history and democracy by doing just that! Now that my rant is over, I wish you all Shana Tova, a very happy, healthy and prosperous year.

Rabbi Ballan thanked Cantor Korobow, Geri Weiss, and the tech crew for all their hard work and reviewed the upcoming Holiday Services schedules. She will be going to Florida from October 28 – 31. This Jewish New Year, I've focused on my health through daily office workouts and events like the JP Corporate Challenge and a 41-floor stair climb. Even though I'm often towards the back, the sense of accomplishment is incredible. I've also picked up a new hobby: Pickleball! You'll have a year to take the course and then 30 days from when you start to complete it.

And, there we were --- my Temple Beth Sholom brethren, lined up along the wall in front of Rabbi Ballan, waiting to head on to the bimah for the portion of the Kol Nidre Service when the Torahs are removed from the Aron HaKodesh and placed upon the lectern in the middle of the stage. Or balanced against the lectern itself. Or just held.

I took the first Torah from Rabbi, followed by Jason Ehrlich, Eric Lustig, Joe DeLeon, and Jim Kettig. Then we each took our spots around the podium with me at the front right corner, followed by Jason, Eric in the middle, Joe, and then Jim opposite me.

And as I stood there listening to Rabbi's meaningful messaging, to the melodious tones of Gail Tishcoff on her flute and the chanting of the High Holiday prayers by Cantor Korobow that took me back to my childhood listening to Cantor Berkson at Temple Beth Am in Randolph, Massachusetts, I was totally enveloped in the incomparable moments. For there is nothing more special on the High Holidays than hearing those familiar traditional tunes.

Fast forward to Yom Kippur day following the morning services when I was speaking with my fellow Torah holder, Joe. He told me that he tried to get my attention during our time on the bimah on Kol Nidre night, that I could have balanced my Torah on the podium to make holding it easier. I told him as a friend, I deeply appreciated his genuine concern for my well-being; but after the first few minutes, I also had a reason why I just held it.

As I took the Torah from Rabbi and stood at that previously stated front right corner of the lectern, I hugged the Torah and held it tight---just as if it was a family member or a dear friend—close to my heart. And, for the duration of that part of the service, I continued holding it in that manner. At different points I closed my eyes to listen to Rabbi, Cantor and Gail, other times I looked at the beautiful stained-glass windows or just to the heavens, thinking about my family, about those close to me and about those who live forever in my heart.

When that part of the service concluded, I walked back to my seat with an unassuming smile on my face, despite it having been during such a solemn moment, and said to Renee that I had that expression, for as I was standing there for that part of the service, with my need to now and then adjust my positioning, and making sure I had a secure grip on the scroll, I had never felt as close to God as I did during that time.

As I later shared my findings with Rabbi, she said she was glad it was so meaningful. And, while holding a Torah may not physically be feasible for everyone, I just wish that all of you could have the opportunity, at least once, to be able to find those special meanings and be lost in your emotions.






