From the Rabbi's desk

Maimonides writes, "At a time when the Temple does not exist and we have no altar for atonement, we have only Teshuvah. Teshuvah atones for all transgressions (against God). Even one who has sinned all his life and has only turned at the end, nothing of wickedness is remembered of him, as it is said, 'And as for the wickedness of the wicked, he shall not stumble thereby in the day that he turns from his wickedness.'" (Ezekiel 33:12)

As I write this article, it is almost Tisha B'Av, the commemoration of the destruction of the first and second Temples in Jerusalem. We turn inward, as our "official" entry into the High Holy Day period begins in the Hebrew month of Elul. The beginning of Elul to the end of Yom Kippur is a 40-day period of reflection and introspection. Our tradition, according to Pirke derebbe Eliezer, an 8th century Midrashic work, links this 40-day period with that of the 40-day period in which Moses ascended Mount Sinai a second time to receive the Ten Commandments. That same period begins on the first of Elul, which just happens to fall on September 3rd this year. Just as we look for reconciliation, forgiveness and renewal, so too does the second set of tablets represent the reconciliation of God and Israel after the sin of the golden calf. We hope, just as God forgave the Children of Israel, that God will forgive us as well.

Forgiveness and reconciliation is not easy. So, how do we begin the process? There are many traditions that help us prepare during this period. One such ritual is the Selihot service, which takes place on the Saturday evening that precedes Rosh Hashanah. According to the Machzor Vitry, an 11th century work describing the yearly cycle of observances and prayers, it is customary on that night "to rise early to the synagogue before the sun rises and beg for mercy" It was originally thought that the most propitious time to petition God was just before dawn. The person in charge of prayers in the Jewish villages of Eastern Europe would make the rounds and knock on each door to summon everyone to services. Eventually, it became a custom to hold this very important Selihot service at a time more convenient midnight. to the masses – at Nowadays, even midnight is difficult for most of us, so in order to entice you to come, we are doing something a little different this vear-"Dinner and a Movie" before our Selihot service on Saturday evening, September 24. We hope that in addition to being "fun", it will provide food for thought (pun intended!) and help prepare us for the upcoming High Holy Days. The movie is "Ground Hog Day." Although billed as a comedy, it has a universal message uniquely tied to Teshuvah. If you haven't seen it (or even if you have) come join us for a pasta dinner, the movie, and a discussion afterwards. Our Selihot service will follow at 8 pm. Please see the


From the Parents' Association






