From the Rabbi's desk

"The Eternal God called out to Adam and said to him, "Where are you?" Ayeka? [Gen. 3:9]

As we usher in the month of September, we are in the midst of the last month of the year on the Hebrew calendar. Elul. Traditionally Elul marks the beginning of the 40-day period of and introspection. reflection culminating with Yom Kippur. Our tradition, according to Pirke deRebbe Eliezer (an 8th century Midrashic work) links this with the 40-day period in which Moses ascended Mount Sinai a second time to receive the Ten Commandments. As you recall, Moses came down with the first set of tablets and smashed them in anger after he saw the children of Israel dancing around a molten calf. How could the shattered pieces of the tablets possibly be put together again? How could the relationship between God and Israel be repaired? Indeed, the first set of tablets could not be repaired. They needed to be carved once again. The relationship between God and Israel would take much work. This healing, or reconciliation, is a process that would take some time. Perhaps that is why we too need time to prepare. Teshuvah cannot take place in one day.

As we look forward to a new year and new beginnings, I am reminded of the verse in *B'reisheet* (Genesis) when God calls out to Adam to ask, "Where are you?" In Hebrew, that is *Ayeka*. We need to

stop and take notice of where we are in our lives in order to begin the process of reconciliation and healing. *Ayekah*? Where are you in this process?

Judaism has many ways to help us prepare during this period. One such ritual is the *Selichot* service, which takes place on the Saturday evening that precedes Rosh Hashanah. This year it is September 16. Please join us for a potluck dinner welcoming our new Cantor, Jerry Korobow at 6 pm followed by the service at 8 pm.

Tashlich ceremony is another preparatory ritual, where we symbolically cast our sins out by throwing breadcrumbs into a body of water. Scholars think Tashlich's came roots European Jews and spread to Sephardic Jews in the 16th century through the influence of the Kabbalists (mystics) who lived in Safed in Northern Israel. It became very popular, even though the rabbis feared that perhaps people would think the simple act of "casting one's sins" into the river would have some magical power to achieve the clearing of their sins, and not follow through with changing their behavior. Indeed the early rabbis in the Reform movement felt the same way. But there is something in the powerful metaphor of water and nature that perhaps draws us to this ritual.

This year, the second day of Rosh Hashanah falls on Friday, September 22, which is also *erev* Shabbat Shuvah. We will hold our *Tashlich* ceremony on the second day of Rosh Hashanah at 5 pm in order to encourage you to stay for a short outdoor Kabballat Shabbat

August Board of Trustees Meeting

The Board of Trustees met on August 14th, 2017. The Board welcomed new Cantor Jerry Korobow. The Board voted to accept new (re-joining) members Herbert & Margot Anker. Our current number of membership units is now 122 family units. Financial Secretary Gail Olenick reported on her ongoing efforts to work with members who need a payment plan. It was agreed that those members who have not paid any dues at all for over a year, and who have not responded to any outreach, will lose Temple membership. The July Financial Report was accepted by the Board, as presented by Treasurer Charlene Metz. Geri Weiss, Pulpit & Ritual Committee Chair reported High Holiday honors are almost set. Martha Hirsch has stepped down from asking temple members to participate in the Shabbat honors and was thanked for having taken it over this past year. Lee Temares of The Bylaws Committee reported on their work to date but no actions were taken at this Board meeting. Dr. Fav Halpern Schildkraut reported on recent successful events and positive responses by several families with young children. Rabbi Ballan reported on her work with Cantor Jerry Korobow on High Holiday services as well as the Shabbat morning nature walks in August. Cantor Jerry Korobow said he is delighted to be at TBS and to be working with Rabbi Ballan. He stated that singing is a communal activity that everybody is able to share. He shared some of his ideas for possible future special musical events. Religious School Board Chair Barbara Gandelman reported on current plans for the Religious School in terms of class structure and some planned special events. It was a general consensus that the recent Saturday morning Family Service and Open House was a big success. Sisterhood President Barbara Gandelman reported on upcoming Fall Sisterhood events. The August 10th Sisterhood Auction raised \$600 and thanks were given to Fred Alperin for auctioneering. Men's Club President Jeff Cohen reported they have sorted over 13,000 books in preparation for Bazaar and continue to hold regular book sorts. PA Co-President Erica Bernstein reported on upcoming Fall events. Barry Packer, Ways & Means Chair, reported the progress on the November 11th Chicken Soup Cook-Off.

Join Rabbi Ballan and Cantor Korobow For Tashlich, Shabbat, and Dinner in Little Bay Park at Fort Totten Friday, Sept. 22, 2017

<u> 5:00 pm - Tashlich (תשליך)</u>

A ritual that many Jews observe during Rosh Hashanah. "Tashlich" means "casting off" in Hebrew and involves symbolically casting off the sins of the previous year by tossing pieces of bread or another food into a body of flowing water.



<u>**6:00 pm - Shabbat**</u> – A weekly ritual that many Jews observe starting Friday evening. This includes lighting Shabbat candles, saying Kiddush, and motzi over challah, and reciting specific prayers.



<u>Dinner</u> — A daily ritual that celebrates that empty feeling in the stomach. For this, families attending need to bring food and drink. There are some benches, it is suggested to bring chairs!

Directions to Fort Totten/Little Bay Park

At Bell Blvd and 212 St make a right or left (depending on which direction you are coming from) to go under the Cross Island Pkwy Continue towards Fort Totten – turn left into parking lot (before entrance to Fort Totten!)
