From the Rabbi's desk

It was a wonderful experience to host a Passover seder at Temple Beth Sholom on the second night of the holiday. We have not had a seder at Temple in a number of years and it was an unexpected pleasure to celebrate with over 40 people! Thank you Geri Weiss and Fay Schildkraut for your hard work in planning and executing the seder on such short notice.

During this second seder, we began counting the "omer," and this counting continues until Shavuot. The omer, which literally means "a measure," was an offering of the first of the grain or barley harvest, which was brought to the Temple. We learn in the Torah to count seven weeks from the time of the offering of the omer. The Hebrew word for week is 'shavua' which is derived from the word for seven, sheva. Shavuot is the plural of shavua, literally meaning 'weeks.' Thus, because of this ritual counting. the period between Passover and Shavuot became known as the omer. Shavuot, like Pesach and Sukkot, the other two holidays of the shalosh regalim, is dual in nature. It is both agricultural, and historical. Passover celebrates our liberation from Egypt and slavery, and Shavuot celebrates our receiving of Torah at Sinai. It can be hard to connect the agricultural aspect of the omer period to our modern lives. But, perhaps in our the omer, we counting symbolically connect liberation with the idea of Torah, and to change the

focus to one of preparing ourselves to receive "Torah," and bring it into our lives.

This year Shavuot falls on Sunday, May 20th. We will be celebrating and receiving the Torah a differently: Shavuot Cunningham Park! Join us for a short Yizkor Service and Picnic in the Park. with lots of activities for our families and children of all ages, including a Ten Commandments Scavenger hunt, games, and lots of singing, all beginning at 10:00 a.m.

There are many ways to bring Torah into our lives: one is by being committed to healing and repairing world. You can actively participate by joining us for Mitzvah Day on May 6th. Donate blood or help with the Blood Drive; donate much needed toiletries and food to the Academy Plus class's Food Drive: volunteer to be a member of our Caring Committee or our Social Action Committee. Another way is to actually study Torah; I encourage you to try our weekly Shabbat Torah study group. No experience with Hebrew or Torah study is necessary; just come ready to ask questions and learn with us!

April Board of Trustees Meeting

The Board of Trustees met on Monday, April 9th, 2018. Financial Secretary Gail Olenick reported our current membership is 118 family units, with 50% of membership dues paid to date. She is trying to work with members who owe dues to arrange a payment plan. The March Financial Report was accepted by the Board as reviewed by "Assistant Treasurer" Robin Myers.

Rabbi Ballan reported on the successful Second Night Passover Seder, with 43 people attending. Cantor Korobow will be covering for Rabbi Ballan on April 20th Friday night service, with past President Adam Gandelman and with the participation of the youth choir.

The Pulpit and Ritual Committee has begun to arrange for Lay Leaders over the summer and High Holiday honors and encourage volunteers for either or both to contact Geri Weiss. Sisterhood, Men's Club, and Parents' Association Presidents (Barbara Gandelman, Jeff Cohen, and Erica Bernstein, respectively) reported recent and upcoming events.

Ilyne Rabinowitz, Chair of Social Action Committee, reported that TBS will partner with OFA-NY to sponsor a fun voter's registration and education event coordinated with an Open Mic on June 2^{nd} .

The Board voted to accept a one-year contract with Cantor Korobow. Jim Kettig reported on the DEP's proposed bioswales (green infrastructure) with options that may be advantageous to us. The next Congregational Meeting is set for Tuesday, May 22nd, which means that the next Game Night will need to be rescheduled.

Deirdre Weliky, Chair of the Caring Committee, reported on their first meeting which included input by Rabbi Ballan and President Fay Halpern Schildkraut. Marchel Gillin reported Paul Engel will be able to resume the Food Pantry in the coming months. Gail Tishcoff reported on the upcoming May 6th Blood Drive, which will hopefully be including volunteers from LFCC.



"The Two-Family House" Lynda Cohen Loigman

Brooklyn, 1947: In the midst of a blizzard, in a two-family brownstone, two babies are born, minutes apart. The mothers are sisters by marriage: dutiful, quiet Rose, who wants nothing more than to please her difficult husband; and warm, generous Helen, the exhausted mother of four rambunctious boys who seem to need her less and less each day. Raising their families side by side, supporting one another. Rose and Helen share an impenetrable bond forged before and during that dramatic winter night.

When the storm passes, life seems to return to normal; but as the years progress, small cracks start to appear and the once deep friendship between the two women begins to unravel. No one knows why, and no one can stop it. One misguided choice; one moment of tragedy. Heartbreak wars with happiness and almost, but not quite, wins. Moving and evocative, Lynda Cohen Loigman's debut novel The Two-Family House is a heart-wrenching, gripping multigenerational story, woven around the deepest of secrets.

Cantor's Corner

When I was sixteen, my best friend was a very good musician. Mark played guitar and piano, and we actually hacked around in a garage rock band together. Mark thought I should learn to play the guitar, but I wasn't interested. Nevertheless, he decided I should sing for his guitar teacher, and we worked out an arrangement of an old spiritual ala Paul Robeson. I figured we'd go and do the song, and that would be the end of it-he'd leave me alone about the guitar.

We went to visit Kent Sidon at the school he ran in Roslyn Heights-the Guitar Workshop. It was a dilapidated house in a quiet residential neighborhood, and Kent matched it in appearance. He was a short, slightly stooped middle-aged man with longish black-gray hair balding on top, a scraggly goatee, and dark framed glasses. I would later learn that the character in the old tweed sport coat, tie, and rumpled trousers was Jewish, and had grown up in Great Neck. Mark introduced me, Kent settled back to listen, and we began. When we finished, he jumped up and ran over, hugging us and slapping us on our backs. "My god, just like Paul Robeson" he cried (I sang as a bass-baritone back then). "You must study guitar, and I refuse to take money!" This was my introduction to an important and unique mentor.

Kent was a brilliant and visionary classical and folk guitar teacher. He had studied with the immortal Andres Segovia, had produced classic folk music concerts in Greenwich Village during the folk boom (think Judy Collins, Pete Seeger, The Almanac Singers, etc.), and was single-handedly trying to spread the gospel of guitar as a legitimate instrument throughout the area. I still wasn't sure I was interested in the guitar.

After studying classical guitar with Kent for three months, the school year was ending. He asked if I was interested in teaching at the Guitar Workshop that summer. They were offering a special program to elementary school teachers on how to use music in their classrooms, and he wanted me (16 years old) to teach adults how to play. "How can I do that? I barely know how to play myself." "You know more than they do" he said. I did teach that summer. I also found my first girlfriend, and came into contact with all the musician/teachers at the Workshop. They were all at least ten years older, and into many different kinds of music. I was surrounded with classical, folk, blues, rock, bluegrass, old-time, and everything in between. Each night after classes were over, we'd sit around and jam. Needless to say, I was now very interested in guitar and all that went with it.

My involvement with the Guitar Workshop and the extraordinary Kent Sidon continued through high school. It was Kent who turned me on to his alma mater, Oberlin College, and insisted that it was the ideal place for me to go. He was right. Kent and the Workshop family were my first real introduction to alternative, anti-establishment lifestyles, different political points of view, and to music as a way of life. Sadly, Kent died quite a few years ago. He was not an old man. The Guitar Workshop continued for a while, and eventually disappeared.

Scoop's Schmooze

As Jewish people, we have the great fortune of being able to celebrate and commemorate more than a dozen holidays throughout the year. Some are joyous like Purim, Chanukah and Simchat Torah; while others are more meaningful, and even solemn, such as Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur and today's Holocaust Remembrance Day, Yom Hashoah. And, every week, from Friday's sunset until sundown on Saturday, we are grateful to celebrate Shabbat. Each Sabbath possesses similarities to the one from the week before, as well as to the one for the week that follows. Yet each one also has its own uniqueness, making it different from every other one throughout the year.

However, the common denominator that joins every holiday, every Shabbat; is that the Jews are never alone. As family and friends and acquaintances, we are all in this wonderful life together.

And, that also goes in celebrating and honoring those whose lives have come before us, yet who are no longer physically with us. These are the people, who have paved the way for us; who have blessed us with the memories of their wisdom and laughter, their sage words of advice and their joy. As the eight days of Passover have come and gone, as a holiday it is a combination of solemnity in the generations of Jews that were slaves in Egypt and in joy of the Exodus from Egypt and that God "passed over" the homes of the Jews when the first born Egyptians were being slain.

So to honor both emotions of Pesach, before the holiday started, and as we were preparing for the first seder with my family in Boston, it was important to me to visit Sharon Memorial Park. I went with Renee, my brother-in-law and my niece, and even if I went alone, I would not have been alone.

For we were there to visit both sets of my grandparents, an aunt and an uncle of mine; as well as my brother-in-law's father and grandparents (ironically who had the names of Isidore and Rose, which is the same as my in-laws). These are the people who brought my parents into this world, made the greatest difference in their universe, and thus, were ultimately responsible for me, and the person I have become. They gave us all life and breath. They showed us all right from wrong. They created memories that ultimately paved the way for all sorts of hopes and dreams.

So many of those memories are intertwined with all of these different Jewish holidays. Growing up, they were with us at seders, where we had countless people at our home. My grandfather (who is one of my life's greatest heroes) made potato latkes with the best of them. My aunt always had her chicken soup for dessert so she would always have room for everything else. No matter whosever home we were at, the aroma of food cooking filled the kitchens with their own distinct smells.

As I walked from site to site to site of my four grandparents, and my aunt and uncle (which three sites actually form a triangle with 27 steps in between each-and in another bit of irony, my sister and I were both born on the 27th of the month) and knelt down by their plaques to talk to them, it was as if it was Passover from 40 or 50 years ago, or more. And, like always, they were there.

For all of the Jewish holidays have special meanings. And, the ability to be able to share them with family and friends in shul and around the dinner table; as well as always being able to relive those memories from decades ago will make every holiday hold that special place in all of our hearts.

And, especially today, on this holiday of Yom HaShoah, WE MUST NEVER FORGET!


