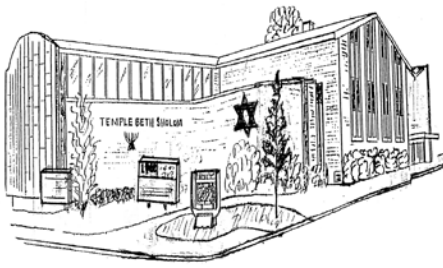

## From the Rabbi's desk

The first day of September coincides this year with the "official" beginning of the High Holy Day period, as we hold a *Selichot* service to begin the new week before Rosh Hashanah. But really, it began even earlier, on the first of Elul. Elul through the end of Yom Kippur is a 40-day period of reflection and introspection. Our tradition, according to *Pirke derebbe Eliezer*, an 8th century Midrashic work, links this 40-day period with that of the 40-day period in which Moses ascended Mount Sinai a second time to receive the Ten Commandments, which also began on the first of Elul. Just as we look for reconciliation, forgiveness and renewal, so too does the second set of tablets represent the reconciliation of God and Israel after the sin of the golden calf. We hope, just as God forgave the Children of Israel, that God will forgive us as well.

Forgiveness and reconciliation is not easy. However, one of the many traditions that help us prepare during this period is the *Selichot* service. According to the *Machzor Vitry*, an 11<sup>th</sup> century work describing the yearly cycle of observances and prayers, it is customary on that night "to rise early to the synagogue before the sun rises and beg for mercy." It was originally thought that the most propitious time to petition God was just before dawn, right after Shabbat. The person in charge of prayers in the Jewish villages of Eastern Europe

each door to summon everyone to services. Eventually, it became a custom to hold this very important *Selichot* service at a time more convenient to the masses—at midnight. Nowadays, even midnight is difficult for most of us, so in order to entice you to come, we will begin with "Dinner and a Movie" at 6 p.m. Join us for "Coco," the animated Pixar/Disney movie inspired by the Mexican Day of the Dead holiday. (It is rated PG-13.) Afterwards, we will have a brief discussion on the way Jews remember our ancestors, specifically Yizkor and the High Holidays. Our *Selichot* service will follow at 8:15 p.m.

During the Days of Awe (The High Holy Day Period) we focus on forgiveness. Most of us use this time to ask forgiveness for wrongdoings we have done, but it is also important to forgive the wrongs that have been done to you. We learn in *Ben Sira* [28:2-4]: "*Forgive your neighbors for their wrongdoings, and then your sins will be forgiven when you pray. Should one person cherish anger against another, and then ask for healing from God? Does that person have no mercy for a person like themselves, and yet pray for personal sins?*"

Walter and I wish all of you a sweet and healthy New Year!

## August Board of Trustees Meeting

The Board of Trustees met on Monday, August 14<sup>th</sup>, 2018. President Fay Schildkraut remarked that the fundraising for Temple repairs is still on and so far, we have collected \$16,500.

The date for the next Board of Trustees meeting was rescheduled from September 25<sup>th</sup> to Thursday, September 6<sup>th</sup>, which will give the Board an opportunity to vote on new members before the High Holidays.

The Report from the Financial Secretary, Gail Olenick stated that we currently have 119 member units. \$36,000 in membership dues is still owed to TBS. Treasurer, Charlene Metz reported that cash was up but this was a reflection of monies collected from the fundraising designated for building repairs. Everything else was unchanged. The Financial report was accepted by the Board.

President Schildkraut informed the Board that the finance committee was recommending a change in the Membership Categories since the old one was too confusing. The recommended new categories were:

Singles under 65

Families over 65

Singles over 65

Post Confirmand - 25 & under, single living at home.

A motion was made and unanimously passed by the Board.

Rabbi Ballan said it was good to be back. The final service of the year was held in Little Bay Park. Geri Weiss, in honor of her retirement, provided a delicious catered meal. The service was lovely and well attended.

This Saturday there will be a Nature Walk followed by lunch at the Rabbi's home. For Selichot, we will be serving Pizza and salad and showing the movie "Coco" followed by Selichot service. A new Chai Mitzvah class will be formed after the High Holidays. The graduating class will be leading this Friday night's service.

Cantor Korobow said it was good to be back. He had a wonderful vacation in South Africa. Both he and the Rabbi are working on the High Holiday programs. He was looking forward to an exciting new year. There will be a guest musician several times during the year. The first one will be on Friday, October 5<sup>th</sup>. On Friday, November 2<sup>nd</sup>, we will be having a Jazz Shabbat service, the choir will be asked to participate in this service. Flyers will be going out for an upcoming shirathon on October 28<sup>th</sup>.

The report from Geri Weiss, Pulpit and Ritual thanked everyone who had agreed to participate in the High Holiday services and encourage all to attend the Selichot service.

Fay Schildkraut, Membership chair, announced that Temple Shalom of Floral Park has officially closed and we have been reaching out to them for the High Holidays.

The welcome back open house will be on Friday, August 24<sup>th</sup> at 6:00 p.m. Pizza and hot dogs will be served.

Barbara Gandelman, Religious school board chair reported the Shabbat morning service for young families went really well. She thanked the Rabbi, Cantor and school principal, Karen for making it a success. She went over the class breakdown and upcoming plans for the New Year.

Welcome back! I hope everyone had a wonderful summer. Just saying that makes me think back to elementary school, and having the teacher request an essay entitled "What I Did on My Summer Vacation".

As many of you know, in my non-synagogue life, I'm an attorney. So, when I'm not at the synagogue, I'm usually still working. But, my wife Zo and I do periodically take vacations. This summer, we had truly great one. We visited South Africa for about two weeks.

The country is breathtakingly beautiful-endless mountain ranges, gorgeous valleys, wine country with vast vineyards, magnificent coastlines. All of this makes for wonderful fresh produce, excellent meat, poultry and fish, terrific wine, and great sightseeing. We also visited Kruger National Park, a game preserve the size of Israel. There, we saw elephants, warthogs, giraffes, lions, rhinos, leopards, impala, cape buffalo, baboons and on and on.

As I'm sure you're aware, South Africa has a very complex history. Originally occupied by various tribal cultures, early on it was utilized as a supply stop by the Portuguese. The Friday night before we were to fly home, we attended a Shabbat service at Temple Israel, a Reform synagogue in the Green Point area of Cape Town. The service was very similar to ours, with lots of singing and instruments. I felt right at home, which was an amazing feeling given how far we actually were from home. The following Monday, on our way to the airport, we visited the South African Jewish Museum in Cape Town. On the same property is The Gardens Shul, the oldest Jewish congregation in South Africa, magnificent and built in the old European style. There is also a remarkable Holocaust Center that explores not only the Holocaust, but the themes of racism, prejudice, the "other", and so on. It is thought provoking, relevant, and deeply moving.

As you can see, I was very much impressed with and taken by South Africa. It's an amazing place. But, it's good to be home, and back to our shul. I can't wait to see you all. Maybe I can get Zo to put some pictures together, so you can see what we did on our summer vacation. See you around the campus!

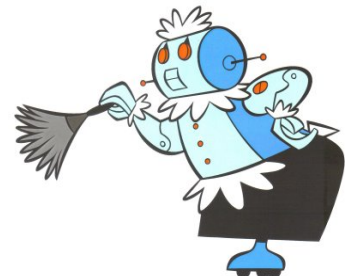
And, the only way that this could be accomplished is by having it been done so by a team---not of associates or acquaintances, but of friends.

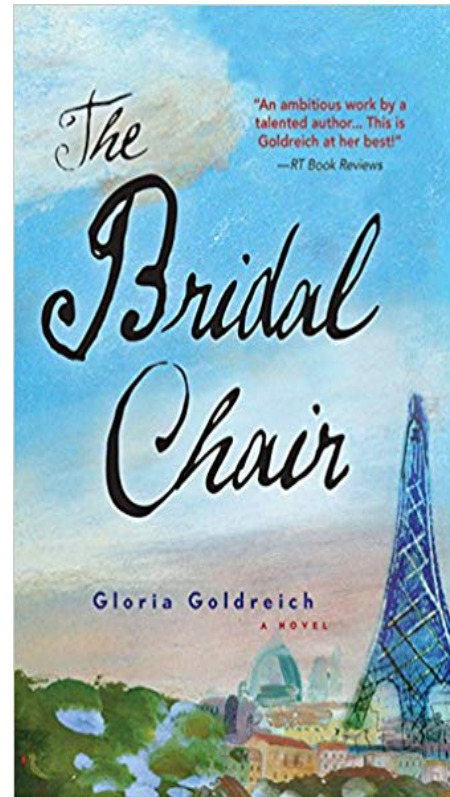

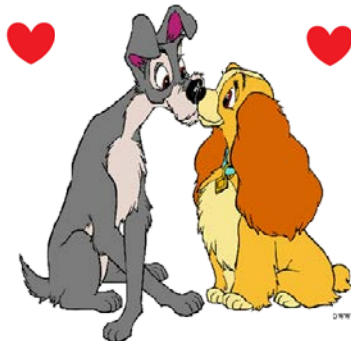
