From the Rabbi's desk

Shalom!

As we enter the month of February, so ends the Hebrew month of Shevat. We experienced our first ever temple-wide Tu Bishvat Seder and dinner last month. Thank you to everyone who pitched in and made it possible! We celebrated the New Year for trees, ate at least 15 fruits (including the seven biblical ones) and had a wonderful Shabbat meal.

As soon as Tu Bishvat is over. I naturally start thinking about our next holiday, Purim. Normally it falls just four weeks after Tu Bishvhat, on the 14th of Adar. This year however, is a little different, as it is a leap year. Since the Jewish months are directly related to the cycle of moon's orbit around the earth, we would lose 11 days a year. Before long, we would be celebrating Passover in December and Chanukah in the summer, which we can't do because we learn in the Torah (Ex. 23:15) "You shall observe the Feast of *Matzot*...at the set time in the month of Abib" (literally "Spring"). Seven times within a 19 year cycle we add an entire month to the calendar, which works out to every two to three years or so. This extra month becomes Adar II, the 13th month on the calendar. Adar I begins on February 6th, which is actually one day after the Chinese Lunar New Year. Purim will be celebrated in Adar II, which will fall on the evening of March 20th. Essentially there are no Jewish holidays in Adar I except for "Purim Katan" or "Little Purim" on the 14th of the month. In traditional circles, prayers of supplication

(tachanun) are not read and fasting and eulogies are prohibited. That's about it.

There are a few explanations as to why we celebrate Purim in Adar II. at the end of our calendar cycle. One is that our sages wanted to keep the time period between Passover and Purim the same linking the redemption of Esther with the redemption of the children of Israel at the Sea of Reeds. Another comes from a midrash found in the Talmud [Shabbat 88a]: "And they stood under [at the foot] of the mountain" (Ex. 19:17). R. Avdimi bar Hama said: This teaches that the Holy One suspended the mountain upon them, like an inverted vat, and said to them: If you accept the Torah it is well; if not your burial will be right here. R. Ahah bar Jacob said: This story would justify a claim that Israel accepted the Torah under duress [thus nullifying the covenant with God]! Rava said: Nevertheless. the people of Israel freely accepted the Torah in the days of king Ahaseurus, as it is written: "The *Iews established and accepted"* (Esther 9:27), meaning established in their time what they had accepted at Sinai.

We come full circle from the first month (Nissan) and Passover, to the last month and the celebration of Purim. An extra month in the calendar, gives us an extra month to prepare! Please email me if you would like to participate in our Purim Shpiel next month, on March 20th. We will have two or three rehearsals.

The Board of Trustees met on Monday, January 14th, 2019. President Fay Schildkraut thanked outgoing Trustees Fran Goldman and Maxine Simon and Financial Secretary Gail Olenick for their service to Temple.

Gail Olenick, Financial Secretary, reported we have 123 member units. Charlene Metz, Treasurer, presented the December Financial Report, which was approved as presented. She also presented the proposed 2019-2020 budget which the Board approved for presentation to the Congregation on January 22nd, 2019 at the January Congregational Meeting.

Rabbi Sharon Ballan reported on recent and upcoming services and special events. She read a thankyou note from The River Fund for our Holiday toy collection. Samuel Field Y also thanked us for the collection of food and toiletries. She said the new TBS Shabbat Siddur is taking shape. Cantor Jerry Korobow reported David Close and Akiva "The Believer" Wharton will return to TBS as guest musicians for the February 1st Installation Service and the March 1st Shabbat Across America Service.

Geri Weiss, Pulpit & Ritual Committee Chair submitted report that included information about plans for a special service for Yom HaShoah on May 3rd. Andrea Odintz, Religious School Board Chair, and Erica Bernstein, Parents' Association Co-President reported the Havdalah Service and Game Night on Jan. 12th were well attended and fun. All are urged to RSVP for the upcoming January 18th, 2019 Tu Bishvat Shabbat dinner and Family Service at 7:00 p.m. The Board approved a motion for the Negotiations Committee to have initial discussion with Cantor Jerry Korobow for the contract year starting July 1st, 2019.

Barbara Gandelman, Sisterhood President stated that the next book club is on Sunday, February 10th at 10:30 a.m. They will be reading "The Man in the White Sharkskin Suit". She asked all to keep a look out in the Voice for option to pay a lump sum to Sistergrams for the rest of the year. Hamantashen baskets will be for sale again this year.

Joy Bobrow, Bazaar Co-Chair and Jeff Cohen (books), reported on efforts already initiated for next year's Bazaar. Jim Kettig, House Committee Chair, updated the Board on his efforts to get bids for ballroom window work. David Chenkin is the Chair of the new Security Committee and he reported to the Board on his vision and time line for design and implementation of an evacuation plan and to address other issues pertaining to current-day security concerns. "The Man in the White Sharkskin Suit"



Lucette Lagnado's father, Leon, is a successful Egyptian businessman and boulevardier who, dressed in his signature white sharkskin suit, makes deals and trades at Shepherd's Hotel and at the dark bar of the Nile Hilton. After the fall of King Farouk and the rise of the Nasser dictatorship, Leon loses everything and his family is forced to flee, abandoning a life once marked by beauty and luxury to plunge into hardship and poverty, as they take flight for any country that would have them.

A vivid, heartbreaking, and powerful inversion of the American dream, Lucette Lagnado's unforgettable memoir is a sweeping story of family, faith, tradition, tragedy, and triumph set against the stunning backdrop of Cairo, Paris, and New York.





I want to talk about something I've found very interesting over the course of my years as a cantor. That is the psychology of synagogue seating. That phrase probably elicits a rather pregnant pause-what is he talking about?

For those of you who attend our services regularly on Friday nights, you may (or may not) realize that, other than for a "special event", we generally get from eight to twenty people attending. Despite the small number, folks seem to sit as far from each other as possible in the sanctuary. And, they also seem to sit as far as possible from us folks up on the *bima*. This is not unique to our synagogue. It was also the case in my previous synagogue, and I've often seen it elsewhere. I don't know why this is the case.

The reason I bring this up is that Rabbi Ballan, Karen Feit and I had a completely different experience at Temple on Friday night, December 14th, 2018. That night, there was a combined Junior Congregation/Shabbat service held in the Frank S. Greene Room. Our students led the service along with Karen. The Rabbi and I were basically the backup band. With a full complement of students, many of their parents, and a nice turnout of our Friday night "regulars", we had a very healthy congregation that night which virtually filled up the space.

It appeared that, because of the size and configuration of the space and seating, people had little choice but to sit together. And that simple reality seemed to create a greater feeling of togetherness, participation and engagement. I don't know if congregants felt that way, but certainly I, Rabbi Ballan and Karen did.

Obviously, the smaller the room, the cozier the arrangement was. In the Frank S. Greene Room, virtually everything is moveable-the chairs, the tables, the lectern and the people. Conversely, in the sanctuary, as a practical matter, the only thing that is moveable is you. Don't get me wrong-we have a beautiful sanctuary of which we're all justifiably proud. But I believe we could enjoy it differently if we were all physically closer together within it.

The Rabbi and I often ask people to move forward as we are about to begin a service, and once in a while, people do so. I guess that I'm asking you to consider the idea. It's a kind of strength in numbers thing-if people are sitting together with others who are singing, they're more likely to sing. If you are sitting in closer proximity to others, it is much easier to read aloud and remain "in sync". Let's give it a try-let's come down front, and sit together, and see what happens and how it feels. It felt great at that Junior Congregation/Shabbat service. I believe that that same feeling can be achieved in our sanctuary with a little more "togetherness". Let's see what happens. All the best!



Scoop's Schmooze

Between the writing of this piece in the middle of January and when you will receive The Voice in your mail, is the Torah portion Beshalach, also known as Shabbat Shirah; which actually happens to be the 44th anniversary of my bar mitzvah.

And, there are two bits of irony behind that. One is for those who have sat in close proximity to me during services over the years, for me being a bar mitzvah on the Shabbat of Song; well, that is quite an oxymoron—me and Shabbat of Song. Having Renee Bat Mitzvahed on Shabbat Shira would have made much more sense. Secondly, the candle-lighters for the services that night will be Erica Bernstein and Elana White, whose children Dara, Justin and Seth, respectively, will make up almost half of Temple Beth Sholom's bar and bat mitzvahs for 2019.

The Bar Mitzvah and Bat Mitzvah are among the most special of days in a Jewish person's life when one becomes a Jewish adult. The day includes being called to the Torah, reciting the prayers and many joyous celebrations. But, what may be overlooked is expressed on the website jewishgiftplace.com under the heading of *Importance of Becoming a Bar Mitzvah or Bat Mitzvah*, where it is stated: "When a Jewish child reaches maturity and has his/her Bar Mitzvah or Bat Mitzvah, the parents celebrate because they have successfully raised their child into adulthood. The child celebrates his/her growth into adulthood."

And maybe that first sentence is why almost half a century later, I am able to look back at this special day as if it were yesterday. For I am so fortunate my parents have kept the memories of my Bar Mitzvah alive since Saturday, January $25^{\rm th}$, 1975.

Which is why I can sit in my den and read all of the details of my day that my mother typed years ago on her Smith-Corona—of who had the aliyot, of who were the gabaiim, the hagbah, the gelilah, and who opened and closed the ark. Which is why I can look at my bar mitzvah album and remember the events of that night; and see who wheeled in the cake, brought in the tallit and the candle, and who lit the candles on the cake. To see my eight friends who participated in a unique Havdalah service before the reception; and reflect on all who were there, yet so many who are no longer with us, except for the wonderful memories.

Which is why I can sit and read the speech I wrote four decades ago, and see by my thoughts and ideas then, and who I am now, that the more things change, the more they stay the same. "Deborah was wise, and because of the many good ways she used this wisdom, people admired her. If you use your ability in life the right ways, people will respect you. Having responsibility and sharing leadership is a part of growing and adulthood. Planning each day as it comes will help you to reach new goals in life."

16,055 days later I am blessed that my parents are still celebrating their raising me into adulthood, and that I can plan every day with new goals and dreams.
