The month of May brought a wonderful, but unusual Confirmation Service led by our Confirmands: Katie Galchus, Danielle Gandelman and Valentina Gillin – difficult times bring out the best in our young people!

I am most pleased to report that our application for the Payroll Protection Program was approved! We received the funds mid-May. This money will be used to pay the salaries of our employees and our utilities for the eight weeks following the funding of the loan. This is really an incredible piece of good news for us as we realize many temple members may be having financial difficulties and dues have only been sporadically received!

We also received a donation from the Flushing Jewish Community Council and we truly appreciate Paul Engel coming through for us!

We hope to be able to open our building for Summer Services but if not by then, hopefully by the High Holidays. To that end we have established a task force to develop plans on reopening our building once the OK has been given by State and Local Government. Remember, we are a temple family and despite the fact that the building is closed, we are still here and the building in and of itself does not define us as a Temple family! May Board of Trustees Meeting

The Board of Trustees met on Monday, May 11, 2020 via videoconferencing (Zoom) due to COVID-19 restrictions. President Joy Bobrow thanked Rabbi Ballan and Cantor Korobow for uplifting services via Zoom. All May in-Temple events have been cancelled and she requested that all committee meetings be provided remotely via Zoom. She reported that our application for the Payroll Protection Program was approved and we received the funds last week. This will cover salaries of all Temple staff plus utilities for the eight weeks following the loan. Any unused portion of the loan after that point must be repaid within 18 months at 1% interest, but the bulk of the loan will be forgiven.

Robin Myers, Financial Secretary, reported we currently have 118 member units with outstanding dues balance at just over \$64,000.00. The April Financial was approved as presented by Charlene Metz, Treasurer.

Rabbi Ballan reported Zoom services continue to show high attendance. She reviewed recent and upcoming services (via Zoom) through May – and through June, as well. We will need to make plans for options for High Holiday services in the Fall since it is unclear how we will need to adapt to the COVID-19 pandemic crisis over the near future. She voiced her appreciation for how we are all coming together and especially to the Office and Maintenance staff and to the Temple leadership.

Cantor Korobow reported that he has cancelled the June Peter, Paul and Mary Shabbat service with Gathering Time. He said it has been gratifying to note the good turnout for the Zoom services.

Pulpit & Ritual Committee Chair Geri Weiss thanked the Rabbi for managing the Zoom services and coordinating with the Cantor and congregants. We had May shared Shabbat service and the May Confirmation service via Zoom. She reported that it is likely that lay-led services will be via Zoom over the summer.

Parents' Association Co-President Stephanie Rosenberg reported on the PA Shabbat service on 5/8 and the 5/28 May fundraiser at Blaze Pizza (for take-out). Religious School Board Chair Andrea Odintz reported religious instruction has continued remotely and on May 3rd, Mitzvah Day, plans were made for ongoing community service projects

Sisterhood President Barbara Gandelman reported Sisterhood Shabbat was on 5/22 and the May Book Club, reading *Where the Crawdads Sing* by Delia Owens, convened via Zoom on Wednesday, 5/27.

First Vice President Fay Schildkraut, Membership Chair, reported they are reaching out to all members, especially new members, to invite everyone to join in on all the regular services. They are meeting on a regular basis to come up with ideas and plans on how to encourage members to come back to services in the Sanctuary when we are allowed to do so.

President Bobrow, Use of Building, reported that since Temple has remained closed, we have not had contributions from LFCC and Jubilee churches.

She updated the Board on the Temple Gates of Prayer proposal relating to renovations to the kitchen next to the Rabbi's office and to the Frank S. Greene Room in advance of them leaving their building by August. She reported that the Food Pantry continued in May and it was reported that the need is projected to increase.

Jim Kettig, House Committee Chair reported the work on the cooling tower is now complete but pointed out we will need to determine when it makes sense to fill the system and turn it on, because once we do it will need to be maintained.

Eric Bernstein, Adult Education Chair reported he and Eric Lustig are planning a virtual lecture by Dr. L.V. Rutgers on early Diaspora of the Jews for Sunday, June 14th.

Bazaar Co-Chair President Joy Bobrow requested that if we order takeout to try to frequent establishments listed in The Voice and to remember to thank them for their support of Temple and that you hope they will support us this year despite these difficult times.

The Corona Virus is deeply affecting all of us. It is limiting our activities, affecting our work, disrupting the education of our children and keeping us physically separated. At Temple Beth Sholom, we are experiencing all of this. The building remains closed, in-person services and classes are cancelled and are being streamed. Adding to our collective discomfort is the uncertainty—the not knowing what's next and when normal might resume.

Additionally, the financial effects of the virus are widespread; and TBS is not exempt from that; fundraising has ground to a halt. All Temple and community events have been cancelled for the foreseeable future.

Nevertheless, the silver lining is that we have created a new opportunity that we are calling "Chai Hopes". To help make up the budget shortfall, we are asking all Temple Beth Sholom members and friends who are able --to pledge "Chai" (\$18 or a multiple thereof) per month for 12 months, starting in June. For the past few months, although our personal food budgets may have expanded a bit, we are all saving on some of life's luxuries - no hair salon visits, no mani/pedis, less Gourmet coffee, fewer meals out! This small amount repeated over the course of a year can have a big impact on our ability to continue to fulfill our mission. To recognize this effort, everyone who participates will receive a leaf on our "Tree of Life" that can be inscribed as you wish to express appreciation or commemorate a milestone, achievement, or simcha.

How better to combat this virus than to watch our "Tree of Life" bloom with visible symbols of our community strength--and our "Chai Hopes" that we can gather together again very soon?

Hebrew School in the time of Corona

There is an ancient Chinese curse that says, "May you live in interesting times." It is one of the many aphorisms that I repeat to myself like mantras during the forced isolation in which we have been living since just after Purim!

Life has certainly thrown us some curves. No in-person learning. No celebrations with friends and extended family. No special meals in restaurants. Shortages of toilet paper, cleaning products, paper towels, and at different times...flour, eggs, meat, chicken, you name it. But, I have learned there *is* one thing that is still plentiful...the connections we feel as a Temple Beth Sholom community!

Rabbi Ballan and Cantor Korobow started the show with wonderful Zoom Shabbat services. With their initial success and inspiration, we began experimenting with Zoom Religious/Hebrew School. What started out as an informal get together with our students, Rabbi Ballan, and yours truly, has grown to a structured two-day-a- week program. On Wednesdays Beth Hecht and I meet with our students for Hebrew Reading practice. Rabbi Ballan and Ruth Kessler join us as well. On Sundays we are joined by Judith Fastow. I begin with a topical discussion, followed by a Judaica lesson by Morah Judy, who is followed by Morah Ruth with conversational Hebrew. Rabbi Ballan offers comments and insights as the morning progresses. Morah Beth joins in as well.

Over the course of two weeks we discussed mitzvot and what opportunities to perform mitzvot were available to us in lieu of our traditional Mitzvah Day. Students reported back on the mitzvot they had performed. We welcomed members of the Caring Committee who helped with more suggestions and assistance for us.

I am so proud of our students and our teachers who have demonstrated such commitment, flexibility, and devotion to Jewish learning and values in these trying times. It is an honor to learn with you all!

As I am writing, our Shared Shabbat is days away. I am looking forward to our families' participation in what promises to be a lovely service. We have asked parents and children or siblings to participate together in leading parts of the service, making a truly shared experience.



"The Miracle of Diaspora: New Archaeological Discoveries from the Mediterranean"

Prof. Dr. L.V. Rutgers is Professor of Late Antiquity. He is particularly interested in questions of identity formation, migration, religion and violence in Late Antiquity and the Early Middle Ages. He is the author of the award winning *The Jews in Late Ancient Rome: Evidence of Cultural Interaction in the Roman Diaspora* (2000), and various other publications in the area of Jewish-Christian relations, including *Making Myths: Jews in Early Christian Identity Formation* (2009).

Over the years, he has directed "The Jewish Catacombs of Rome" project, and the "Rise of Christianity Project." Currently he is editing the Cambridge Encyclopedia of Late Antique Art and Archaeology (CUP), doing a research project on the Jewish communities of the Diaspora, and planning a new archaeological fieldwork project in Rome.
