From the Rabbi's desk

Shalom!

As of this writing, we haven't even begun the High Holy Days yet! By the time you receive this edition of The Voice, Sukkot will have just about started. I have told many of you before that Sukkot is my favorite holiday—I get to enjoy the outdoors, my vard, and the bounty of my own produce that was grown in my little garden. Everything about the holiday reminds me of our connection to the earth and of nature. The sukkah roof needs to be made of natural materials; we must be able to see the stars at night through it. We decorate it with fruits and vegetables; the lulav that we shake is made of date palm, myrtle and willow leaves, and of course an etrog (citron). We celebrate the holiday with all of our senses sight, sound, smell, touch and taste.

And vet. our sukkot are intentionally fragile structures, reminding us of how impermanent our lives are. A strong wind or rainstorm can take them down, and we have to make other plans. Planning is one thing that has been challenging this year. I am hoping that some of us can get together outdoors for a Sukkot celebration in TBS's Sukkah, and that we can see each other in person (socially distanced, of course, and masked)! Regardless, I will be "zooming" from inside my Sukkah during the week.

Sukkot is the time when we are commanded to celebrate with joy—to be thankful for the abundant harvest, for what we have.

At the same time, the ancients worried about surviving the ensuing winter. Would nature, which was totally out of their control, be kind to them? We, too, are concerned about the future. But ultimately, we have the ability to choose how we look at things. We can be positive and upbeat, or frightened and anxious. I have seen TBS become a very strong and caring community—even if we haven't been physically together. I am confident that the future will bring many opportunities to celebrate with one another, and in person!

May we all be blessed to choose to experience better days in the coming year.

From The President

To My Temple Family,

As I write this article, I am contemplating my remarks for Rosh Hashanah Eve, 5781. I hope that you will have joined us as I "Zoomed" before you as the President of this incredible Temple Beth Sholom Family on a most unusual first night of Rosh Hashanah.

I have decided that this article will be the remarks that I have written for Rosh Hashanah Eve service as I truly hope that they resonate with one and all.

We have much to be thankful for despite the fact that we are not gathering together in person.

We have a warm, vibrant community that has been able to host Zoom Services, Zoom Adult Education events, Zoom Sisterhood events and as important, Zoom Religious and Hebrew school.

We must all remember that we remain a place of gathering – we are a community.

We hold sacred space. Supporting a synagogue is completely different from utilizing a fee-for-service institution. Our value cannot be measured only by programs. It is precisely at this moment that members need to support the most important things in their lives. With all that is going on in the world around us, this is the moment to show up in larger numbers than ever before.

Synagogues are extensions of our homes where Jewish life is marked and celebrated. A place where ethics are upheld, and love and kindness prevail. Through our synagogues the world is healed. Synagogues bring families together to honor sacred time. During hard times, they are where we learn to handle challenges and where resilience is built.

We cannot hide the fact that synagogues cost money to run. Like many small businesses and nonprofits, during COVID-19 our doors have been closed, but our operations are running. Staff, and infrastructure all cost money and all are necessary to support Jewish life. Without membership dues, tuition from religious schools, and donations we simply would not exist. We cannot "take a year off." It is our job to support the ongoing expenses of synagogues and not to wash one's own hands of the obligation. When Rabbi Hillel taught, "Do not separate yourself from the community" (*Pirke Avot 2:5*), he reminded us that each is responsible for our community.

Jewish synagogue life is not here to add additional work or stress to one's life. It is here to be a place that holds emotion, whether joyful or disappointing. Yes, it takes commitment. Those commitments come in the form of time, money, energy, and emotional investment. Ideally, what one gets out of belonging to a synagogue can't be measured by any standard metric. It can only be measured in feelings of love, community, and connection to each other and to the Divine (or to something greater than ourselves).

Cantor's Corner



Just imagine it-the Hall of Fame. It's the ultimate...the top of the mountain. What is the cantor on about now? Am I talking about Babe Ruth, Ty Cobb, Mickey Mantle, Tom Seaver, etc.? Well, no. In this truncated (and incredibly frustrating) baseball season, that's not the Hall of Fame I'm here to discuss.

You see, I don't personally know anyone who's been inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame. But, I can proudly tell you that I have a good friend who has been inducted into the American Banjo Museum Hall of Fame. I'll bet many of you didn't even know that such an institution actually exists-yet it does. And, my wonderful friend, 90 year old banjo virtuoso Roger Sprung, became a member on September 11, 2020.

The American Banjo Museum, located at 9 East Sheridan Avenue, Oklahoma City, OK, "is dedicated to the history of the banjo. The museum's exhibits document the rise of the banjo from its arrival in North America via the Atlantic slave trade to modern times." It's a place I would genuinely like to visit some time.

Roger Sprung, a nice Jewish boy from Manhattan, NY, has made it to the top of the banjo mountain. According to the museum's website, "an argument could be made that Roger Sprung was the first progressive five-string banjoist. While his contemporaries in the bluegrass world were experimenting with swing in the 1940s and 50s, Sprung was expanding the acceptable banjo repertoire to include swing, ragtime, pop and classical styles as well. Credited with introducing bluegrass banjo techniques to the folk music world, Roger's eclectic musical influence is reflected in players such as Bela Fleck while Sprung himself continues to explore new and exciting musical possibilities for the banjo." By the way, Bela Fleck, a staggeringly virtuosic banjo player, is also a nice Jewish boy from...Manhattan, NY.

Roger celebrated his 90th birthday at the end of August, and unfortunately, as the result of a stroke, he can't play his beloved 1927 Gibson Mastertone banjo. But Roger is still teaching, and reaching out to musicians and music lovers. I'm very lucky to know Roger, to count him as a friend, and to have had the opportunity to play with him many, many times. It's not often that we get to work with a master, and a person deeply connected to a tradition. In the cantorial world, I've been fortunate to know, study and work with some great cantors. And in the folk music world, I've been equally fortunate to know and work with people like Roger Sprung.

These folks are masters, and master teachers. I've written about Roger before in my columns, holding him up as an example of remaining engaged as we get older. I'm doing the same again this time around, and tipping my musical cap to a valued friend who's made it to the Hall of Fame! Bravo Roger-how's the weather at the top of the mountain? We banjo players and musicians in general, owe you a deep debt of gratitude-thanks so much for the music, friendship, and corny jokes!

September Board of Trustees Meeting

The Board of Trustees met on Monday, September 14, 2020 via videoconferencing (Zoom) due to COVID-19 restrictions. President Joy Bobrow reported on optimistic progress in the state but urged all to remain vigilant to guard against COVID-19 infection. Revisions to the reopening plan are close to completion.

Temple Gates of Prayer (TGP) is nearly done with their renovations to the FSG room, kitchen, and their office. We are upgrading the alarm system to accommodate their request to access the building via Auburndale Lane. She and her family wished all a happy and healthy New Year.

August minutes were accepted with corrections. Robin Myers, Financial Secretary, reported resignation of one member who has moved out of state. We now have 114 member units. School fees were updated and will be sent out soon. Treasurer Charlene Metz reported the August financial report, which the Board approved as presented.

Rabbi Ballan reported on High Holiday service preparations for the first Rosh Hashanah Zoom service. Many thanks were given to the Pulpit & Ritual Committee, Geri Weiss, Chair, and to President Bobrow for their hard work. Rabbi outlined the many upcoming services and events to be held virtually and in the community. She conveyed her good wishes for the New Year.

Cantor Korobow echoed Rabbi's comments and added the reminder that the technology may or may not work as planned and that all need to be patient and understanding. He reported on the opening of Religious School via Zoom, using break-out rooms successfully. He conveyed his good wishes for the New Year.

Geri Weiss, Pulpit & Ritual Committee Chair, reported on High Holiday Zoom services preparations and acknowledged the work and coordination of Rabbi Ballan and all who are working on this endeavor.

Stephanie Rosenberg, PA Co-President, reported on upcoming Rosh Hashanah bags for students to receive little treats for the holidays.

Andrea Odintz, Religious School Chair, reported that Karen Feit will continue to lead the monthly shared Shabbat services. Ruth Kessler will be the new Religious/Hebrew School Coordinator – a position that will add some administrative responsibilities to her current teaching responsibilities.

VP/Past President Fay Schildkraut, Membership Committee Chair, thanked Lori Lustig for creating and implementing the informative New Year's cards that were sent this year.

Barbara Gandelman, Sisterhood President, reported on the successful Sisterhood Auction which raised \$649.00 for Temple. She thanked Iris Bass, Joy Bobrow, Fay Schildkraut, and Geri Weiss for their hard work and dedication to make it work out. She reported on a new program – Virtual Bingo – which will be starting soon. The new Book Club book is *This Tender Land* by William Kent Krueger and the next Women's Discussion Group, moderated by Deirdre Weliky, is on October 14th.

Religious School News

School has started! Thank you to all of our students and parents who have returned their forms, paid their tuition, and participated in classes on Zoom. Although Religious and Hebrew School is technically remote for now, our families have maintained a closeness that can be felt through the computer screen. There are also some noteworthy tweaks to our format.

Religious School began on Zoom on Sunday, September 13th, with a welcome-back segment introducing the topic of Rosh Hashanah by the Rabbi and the Cantor to the entire school, before enabling breakout rooms for teachers and their classes. The whole school came back together for a few minutes at the end of the session. This differs from last spring's one-room-schoolhouse format. Sunday's remote classes duplicate the classrooms in person, by grade.

Hebrew classes began on Wednesday, September 16th with a significant change. Morah Ruth and Morah Beth are teaching two groups each at separate designated times. The idea behind this decision is to promote shorter but more intensive sessions. Each group contains between three and five students, so there is more opportunity for participation -- and less room to hide!

Along those lines, the School Board and teachers developed Zoom Etiquette Guidelines that were sent out to the parents to read and review with their children. These guidelines remind students that Religious and Hebrew School are virtual classrooms, not free time, and spell out behavior expectations.

In addition to these virtual classrooms, all of our teachers and Geri Weiss collaborated to choose textbooks and workbooks for each class to use at home. Michael Rosenberg and I compiled packages of those books – plus back-to-school apples – for each student to pick up before the High Holy Days.

On this year's school registration forms, I included a parent survey about the possibility of starting Religious School classes in person on Sundays later this fall. The most common answer so far is "It's too soon to decide."

Meanwhile, we welcomed back Karen Feit to co-lead our first Shared Shabbat service of the season on Zoom on September $25^{\rm th}$.

I realize this is a time of transition, albeit temporary. I try to keep in mind that our own reactions to change set an example for our children, who are always watching us (even if it's via a sideways glance while they're on their screens). Let's maintain a positive attitude toward continuing their Jewish education, whether on Zoom or – hopefully before the school year is over – in person. Our kids will rise to our expectations of them.

Looking forward to seeing all of you in person.



In May of 2017, this column, Scoop's Schmooze, made its monthly debut in The Voice. The reason for Schmooze in the title speaks for itself. And Scoop has been my nickname since more than 40 years ago when, during our freshman year in high school, my classmate, John Sullivan dubbed me that. At that time I was working with my Randolph High School sports teams and for the local newspaper, The Randolph Herald. And I was going to be the next Oscar Madison. But, through all of life's twists and turns, while the sports-writing ventures did continue for a while, my professional endeavors took me in a wide array of different directions. Yet, one way or another, the act of putting pen to paper, of pounding on the keys of my Smith Corona or of composing on my laptop, the ability to express myself in writing, to this day, has remained one of my deepest passions; as has my love for all things Temple Beth Sholom.

And, if one were to look back in the archives of The Voice over the last few years, around the October, November and December issues, the content of Scoop's Schmooze is either previewing the Chicken Soup Cook-Off or the recap summary of the event. So while the autumn of 2020 is void of this special event, this version of the Schmooze is still dedicated to it.

For those who don't know, the event was initially borrowed as a segment from the movie Deli Man, tracing the steps of Houston, Texas Kosher deli owner Ziggy Gruber competing in a variety of culinary competitions. As the idea, which we put our own spin on, was initially met with a bit of trepidation, the support through the years from Presidents Adam Gandelman, Fay Schildkraut and now Joy Bobrow; as well as the entire Board of Trustees, has been immeasurable. Team Chicken Soup of Suzanne Fertig, Jeff Cohen, Karla Bonne, Lori Lustig, Sam Rosenberg, and Marchel Gillin; along with far too many other members of the Temple Beth Sholom family to name, have been there to help---from set-up and serving to sales and clean-up. The detailed logistics of the event are always handled impeccably by Rita and Natalie in the office, and Jose and Santos throughout the building. And, our judges, who have given of their time in volunteering, have run the gamut, from TBS's own professional chefs Adam Gandelman and Brett Reichler to local politicians and media types, a New York Post sportswriter and a culinary educator.

The uniqueness of the event can be defined by the winners in the first year---a Kosher deli, a Greek restaurant and a Jamaican restaurant. And, by the fact that in the four years, 13 different vendors have either won, placed or shown; and they have included the previously stated Kosher, Greek and Jamaican restaurants, along with Italian and Caribbean, and soups from diners, grocery stores and pharmacies.

Yet, in reality, Temple Beth Sholom has been the real winner. For during the four years of the event, 72 different vendors---from restaurants, stores and hotels to recreation facilities, movie theatres and museums have all given of their time, their effort, their money, and their wares. They have been there with excitement and generosity.

And, with so many of them we have been able to form genuine relationships with over the years; as I walk through their doors during the summer months, leading up to the upcoming Chicken Soup Cook-Off, when the proprietors see me, after exchanging pleasantries, I am greeted with "what's the date, what time, how much do you need, and what else can I do for you?"

And, while much has changed, much is different and we are missing this year's Chicken Soup Cook-Off, and missing being with each other; ironically, on the website for the Chicken Soup for the Soul book series, it describes what's in its books as "sharing happiness, inspiration and hope through its books."

So, as we gradually move on, may we all share happiness, be inspired every day and have hope for all that is good. And let the second Saturday night of November, 2021, be just like the last several second Saturday nights of November; with the aroma of chicken soup wafting throughout the filled to capacity Temple Beth Sholom ballroom with everyone enjoying delectable food, meaningful conversation, smiles and laughter, family and friends. 




