From the Rabbi's desk

"There is no plant without an angel in Heaven tending it and telling it, 'Grow!""(Genesis Rabbah 10:7).

As I write this, I am still eating latkes and lighting Chanukah candles. Nonetheless, as you read this, we have ushered in the secular New Year 2021 (or getting close to doing so). I am truly glad to see 2020 go! The COVID-19 vaccine has been approved and is beginning to be distributed. There is hope on the horizon, however we still have a long way to go before everyone is inoculated.

Even so, we managed to have lovely Chanukah celebrations through Zoom. I loved seeing everyone's chanukiyot, singing and playing games together. Thank you to everyone who participated.

We have another opportunity to celebrate a new year in January, this time at the end of the month as Tu Bishvat, the New Year for Trees, falls on Thursday, January 28. In the days of the Temple in Jerusalem, our ancestors needed to know how old a tree was in order to determine when it was allowed to offer its first fruit. The Rabbis of the Mishnah transformed this "mitzvah" into one of social action-tikun haolam [repairing /perfecting the world]. In order to fulfill this mitzvah, they suggested tithes, [free-will offerings], corner gleanings, and so forth. On this day, everyone who has a garden is supposed to count up all the fruits and profits from the year and reserve some portion for those who have no garden or fruit to eat from.

The Kabbalists (the mystics of the 16th century) on the other hand, transformed the mitzvah into a spiritual *"tikun haolam."* They tried to get as close to the Garden of Eden as possible, to taste of its fruit and heal its damaged trees.

Nowadays we do a little of both—we remember our bond with the earth, striving to repair it—and renew our covenant with God by holding a Tu Bishvat Seder—a special service and dinner modeled after a Passover Seder. It includes drinking four types of wine (going from white to deep red) and sampling different kinds of fruits, in addition to a meal. For the past two years we have held а special Tu Bishvat/Shabbat Seder at TBS including the meal. This year, because of COVID, we will be holding a virtual Seder/Shabbat service at **7:00 pm (**note different start time) on January 29th. We have an opportunity to experience a multimedia Tu Bishvat Shabbat service together as we did for Passover! There will be singing, eating, and sampling wines and produce. See the flyer in this edition of The Voice for the list of Seder ingredients you will need.

Walter and I wish everyone a very happy and healthy secular New Year.

Embarking on a new and hopefully better year, I thought I'd share a rather funny incident from my prior synagogue. Sadly, a former colleague, Rabbi Scott Corngold, passed away some years ago-but this story will always keep him fresh in my memory.

When I worked with Rabbi Scott on the bima at Temple Emanu-El in Lynbrook, there was one thing you could pretty much count on. He almost always felt too warm, and I almost always felt too cold. If left to his own devices, Scott would probably have kept the sanctuary at the temperature of a meat locker, as was his office.

The Rabbi carried that approach over to our services on the beach (in Long Beach). For several years, we went out to the beach for Tashlich on Rosh Hashanah, and for a mid-summer Friday evening service. Knowing how exposed and windy the boardwalk and environs tended to be, I always made appropriate preparations. I wore jeans, a t-shirt, shirt, sweatshirt, jacket, rain poncho, scarf and hat (I kept extras in the car, just in case-OK, so, maybe I was overdoing it just a bit).

I recall one such occasion where I was so attired. Quite a few congregants were already on the beach, and similarly bundled up. I had my guitar, my music and a music stand all set to go. Strolling leisurely down the beach came Rabbi Scott in his Hawaiian shirt, shorts and flip flops. He chatted with those in attendance as we worked our way to beginning the service. He seemed in absolutely no hurry, despite a poor weather report, gray skies, and ominous clouds rolling in.

After distributing handouts, we began the service. Scott and I were side by side with our backs to the water, as the congregants faced us and the sea. A friend of mine was acting as my page turner, and a lady was standing next to him, looking on. Scott took his time, chatting away. The wind started to blow, and the music in my loose leaf binder began to dance. We sang a few songs, and I could tell from the looks on the faces of some congregants that the sea and sky behind us must have been looking a bit rough. Then, we began to hear thunder in the distance. "Come on Scott" I said to myself, "Move it along." Still no rush. More thunder, closer this time. Then, the lady standing nearby said "Cantor, that's a metal music stand, those are steel strings on your guitar... this is not a good idea." I'm no scientist, but lightning and metal together-forget it! Still, no hurry. Then, there was a giant clap of thunder, and a flash of lightning right behind us. Whoa! Finally, Scott picked up the pace. Then, the rain. Man, you never, ever saw a cantor move so fast. I ran with my guitar and music, my friend with the music stand. Soon, we all found ourselves laughing under the boardwalk. I believe that Rabbi Scott was the last to arrive. "You're a pretty fast runner." he said. "Highly motivated" said I.



## December Board of Trustees Meeting

The Board of Trustees met on Monday, December 14, 2020 via videoconferencing (Zoom) due to COVID-19 restrictions.

President Joy Bobrow opened by acknowledging the wonderful in-person services that were also Zoomed from the sanctuary since the last Board meeting. She thanked all who have donated to the Monthly Mensch fund-raiser. She reported the Kepco Foundation (foundation members are the Kupferberg family – founding members of Temple) will be donating \$5,000 for improved and more permanent equipment needed for video-conferencing Temple events and services. She further discussed options to reduce email blasts to avoid overwhelming congregants.

November minutes were accepted with corrections. Robin Myers, Financial Secretary, reported we still have 113 member units. Treasurer Charlene Metz reported the November financial report, which the Board approved as presented.

Rabbi Ballan wished all Happy Chanukah and reported on the lovely recent Shabbat services from the sanctuary and many Chanukah events provided via Zoom. She thanked Eric Lustig for setting up the audio/visual system; we hope to somehow set up permanent equipment for the future. She reiterated all the many Zoom programs offered on a weekly and monthly basis. Cantor Korobow reported that Religious School is going well. They have been trying to find ways to sing together safely. He acknowledged Eric Lustig for all the complex technological issues that he has helped solve.

Geri Weiss, Pulpit & Ritual Committee Chair, reported on services from the sanctuary; the next one is planned for Jan. 22, 2021, possibly being Rabbi/Cantor led via Zoom only, with no congregants in the sanctuary.

Elaine Larkin reported for Parents' Association and for Religious School. There was a fundraiser at Five Below in New Hyde Park (ended December 31<sup>st</sup>) and one scheduled at the Carvel next to the Temple. PA presented a donation to Temple of \$500.00. For Religious School, she reported on Chanukah events and efforts being made to improve attendance at Shared Shabbat services. The P.A. has used a fund bequeathed to it specifically for educational purposes to extend TBS' Zoom account to include a subscription dedicated solely to the Religious School, which will enable sessions to extend past the 40-minute limit on free accounts being used currently.

Past President Fay Schildkraut, Membership Committee Chair reported that there are two families considering membership.

Barbara Gandelman, Sisterhood President, reported the next book club will be on February 21<sup>st</sup> reading *Floating in the Neversink* by Andrea Simon, with the author joining the meeting. Thanks to Karla Bonne for arranging it. The last Women's Discussion group was on December 16<sup>th</sup> and thanked Deirdre Weliky for facilitating this group. Virtual Bingo continues to be successful. She thanked Lori Lustig and Natalie Strauss who worked hard to make it a success and acknowledged Lori Lustig and Robin Myers for continuing to take care of Sistergrams.

President Joy Bobrow, Use of Building, reported on the LFCC reopening plan and the pending possibility that they may be approved to use the ballroom-only in January.

Jeff Cohen, Men's Club President, reported The Veterans Day event went very well and the Super Bowl "Grid" is in play.

Deirdre Weliky, Caring Committee, reported on the recent addition of Mollie Galchus to the committee and recent telephone outreach efforts. The last Food pantry was December 15<sup>th</sup>; the next scheduled for January 19<sup>th</sup>.

Gail Tishcoff reported the Pre-Thanksgiving Blood Drive netted 24 units and the next drive will be in the ballroom on Sunday January 31<sup>st</sup>.

Ilyne Rabinowitz, Social Action Committee, reported they had a successful coat drive and collected more than 130 coats for Street Life Ministries (sanctioned by NY Cares). They are planning a blanket drive, perhaps in conjunction with another food fundraiser that's in the works.

Barry Packer, Ways and Means, reported the first pick-up dinner fundraiser working with Ben's Kosher Deli was on December 12<sup>th</sup> and is estimated to have raised between \$144 – \$173. He reported on potential Zoom show by Renee Katz and her pianist.

Joy Bobrow, Bazaar Co-Chair, reported the raffle and Chef Adam's Soup sale raised \$1,400.00 and she acknowledged the wonderful "Angel" donations, thanking Anne and Mark Pepper by name.

The Board approved a motion to offer Cantor Jerry Korobow a one-year contract from July 1, 2021 – June 30, 2022 at the same terms and conditions as his current contract. This will be presented at the January Congregational Meeting for Temple membership to ratify.
