

From the Rabbi's desk

"Why Is This Year Different?"

Shalom,

A few years ago, I wrote a March Voice article with the above headline, "Why Is This Year Different?" mainly because we were going to be celebrating Passover on March 25, the earliest that I had ever remembered Passover occurring. This year, Passover will again occur early, (on the eve of March 27th) however *this time*, the headline "Why Is This Year Different" needs no explanation.

It has been a year—different and strange and stressful—since we had experienced our first Zoom *seder*. We have had our lives turned inside out; we have had to recreate how we think and do things. We have had to adapt to new circumstances and even adopt a whole new mindset.

This year we have had to make do with a Zoom Purim Ball, and a Zoom Purim celebration. We are still a vibrant community and we still know how to have a good time and have fun together! Once more our seders will probably be via Zoom as many of us have not had the vaccine vet. I am hopeful that we will be back in the synagogue by the summer and we will have more opportunities to see each other in person. At this one-year "anniversary" of the COVID pandemic, I am reminded that there is a custom of saying the shehecheyenu prayer if you haven't seen someone in person for over a year. When we are once again all together in person, we will celebrate and recite this prayer together.

As we think about Passover and prepare, we are supposed to remember that we were slaves in Egypt. It helps us understand the true meaning of freedom. This whole year has had me thinking about freedom in a totally different way.

Sometimes external forces enslave us—we become slaves to our environment, our surroundings and entrapments, but sometimes we can be our own worst enemies and we enslave ourselves.

I encourage you this Passover to liberate yourselves from your destructive restraints and fears. During the seder, we recall the "bread of affliction." We say, "let all who are hungry, come and eat; let all who are in need, come and share the Pesach meal." I hope that this year we all can focus on the needs of others, and help provide for those whose needs are greater than ours. This has been a very difficult year for many. We have seen the monthly food pantry at TBS grow exponentially. If you know of anyone in need of food, please let them know about this very vital service that we are helping to provide.

May you have a zissen pesach!

We had our first ever (and hopefully last!) virtual Purim Ball on February 27th. Thank you to Dr. Fay Schildkraut and her Membership team for putting together such a wonderful event! And of course, thank you to Natalie and Rita for helping to keep track of all our monies and attendees!

I hope to see all of you at the 25th anniversary of Shabbat Across America on March 5th. Don't forget to drop off gently used blankets and/or new socks when you pick up your food in the parking lot on Thursday evening, March 4th. Thank you to Barry Packer for making arrangements with A&A Gourmet for the catered dinner. Thank you to Ilyne Rabinowitz for arranging for the delivery of blankets and socks – a mitzvah for our Temple Family to participate in a great cause.

BTW, consider playing Bingo in April. I always played when I went up to the Catskills for family weekends and when I would go away on vacations in the Caribbean. Maybe if you play, it will also remind you of some of your fonder memories as well!!

And of course, don't forget to be kind to one another and support each other as much as possible. We are all in this together.

February Board of Trustees Meeting

The Board of Trustees met on Monday, February 8th, 2021 via videoconferencing (Zoom) due to COVID-19 restrictions. President Joy Bobrow opened by welcoming new Trustees Andrea Odintz, Barbara Gandelman, Geri Weiss, Karri Kaufman and Larry Gold and reading required section of the TBS By-Laws.

She reported Eric Lustig has continued to work on installation of the more permanent equipment needed for videoconferencing, financed by the Kepco donation mentioned last month. She has submitted application for another PPP Loan.

January minutes were accepted with corrections. Robin Myers, Financial Secretary, reported we now have 111 member units due to the departure of the Weinberg family who has moved out of state. Treasurer Charlene Metz reported the January financial report, which the Board approved as presented.

Rabbi Ballan welcomed the new Trustees. She reported on recent and upcoming services and stated there are eight readers/chanters scheduled for the Megillah recitation on Purim (February 26th). Cantor Korobow reported that Religious School is going well, services continue to be well attended, and he encouraged all to invite friends to join us at services.

Geri Weiss, Pulpit & Ritual Committee Chair reported on the recent Tu Bishvat service and upcoming Purim and Shabbat Across America services.

Elana White, PA Co-President reported the new laptop purchased by the PA for the Hebrew and Religious School Director had to be returned and other options are being considered. Their two recent fundraisers netted a total of \$56.00.

Past President Fay Schildkraut, Membership Committee Chair reported that hopefully by next meeting there will be two new families to present and she updated the Board on plans for Shabbat Across America Dinner and the Purim Ball, both of which are going to be done remotely.

Barbara Gandelman, Sisterhood President, reported the next Bingo game will be on February 10^{th} and Book Club will be on February 21^{st} . Purim baskets were sent out per details in The Voice.

President Joy Bobrow, Use of Building, reported LFCC has not responded to agreement communications. Congregation Habonim is hoping to return once the Coronavirus is not a threat and when they do, their services in the Frank S. Greene room should not inconvenience Temple Gates of Prayer.

Jeff Cohen, Men's Club President, reported the Superbowl "Grid" winners which included new Trustee Larry Gold, who generously donated the proceeds back to Temple. Men's Club was thus able to present a check of \$500.00.

President Bobrow reported the next Food Pantry was scheduled for February 16th and if anyone is aware of someone who is food-insecure they can be directed to it.

Gail Tishcoff reported the January 31st NYBC-run Blood Drive resulted in 42 pints of blood donated.

Ilyne Rabinowitz, Social Action Committee, reported the blanket and (new) socks drive is planned for March 4th. Donations will be delivered to the Street Life Ministries as they are collected at Temple.

Barry Packer, Ways and Means, reported on how the food catered by A&A for Shabbat Across America will include a 10-15% cash-back donation to TBS by A&A. There will also be a Pick-up Dinner with Cascarino's "Pizza Before Pesach" event that will include a 15% total gross donated back to TBS by the vendor. The (virtual) Zoom cabaret living room concert featuring Renee Katz-Packer will be scheduled for Saturday April 17th.

Eric Bernstein, Adult Education Committee Chair, reported he is working with Ilyne Rabinowitz on a virtual Adult Education Event to speak about community care on April 11th at 10:00 am. He is also working with "Concerts in Motion" to give a lecture on musical events they host to adults 65 or older.

Joy Bobrow, Bazaar Co-Chair, reported there have been many donations for Bazaar and there is a move afoot to sort through it and set up sales via Craigslist or eBay during the Presidents' Week.

Do You Know Someone Who is Food Insecure?

Do you have a friend, neighbor or relative who is? Temple Beth Sholom houses a monthly food pantry that is run by the Flushing Jewish Community Council on the third Tuesday of every month. The food is provided by Met Council of NYC and is kosher.

Although there are different foods provided each month, there are generally food staples included such as rice, pasta, beans, oil, and flour. Often, there are Jewish holiday appropriate items included, and occasionally, fresh produce. There is generally a variety of canned, boxed and bagged foods that will certainly help to supplement anyone's diet.

In order to pick up a prepared package of food, call 718 463 0434 to register, or simply show up at the next food pantry on Tuesday, March 16th between 9:30 and 10:30 am to register and receive your package. As an FYI, please note that often the package is heavy and a shopping cart or other aid with wheels is helpful.



If you are approaching the age of Long Term Care or have relatives or friends who already have reached this age, this is not to be missed.

On Sunday, April 25th at 10:00 am, Temple member and "The Waffles" artist Mollie Galchus will be discussing the "Great American Songbook" and the composers, artists, and Jewish aspects of the collection.

During this pandemic, we know that members face isolation issues. Men's Club



Hi all. Hope everyone's doing well, staying safe, and getting their vaccination. Keep the faith my friends-better times are coming.

I wanted to share a rather cute experience I had the other night. It turned out to be a surprisingly Jewish experience.

As many of you know, due to the pandemic, there have been more and more activities and experiences that have moved online...many utilize Zoom.

As a result, I spend a good deal of time Zooming-and not just for our Temple services. I've attended, sung and played in many online events over these last nine or ten months. Since there are not really any geographical limitations, it's often the case that people show up from not only different cities and states, but different countries and continents.

One event that I often attend and participate in takes place on Sunday nights from 8:30 until 10:00 pm. This started out as a long-running bluegrass music "jam session" that took place every week at a place called The Irish Whiskey Bar in Astoria. It's another way for our children – and the rest of us – to feel special. This month's service is on March 12^{th} .

Don't forget to join our monthly Shared Shabbat, led by our beloved former Religious School principal Karen Feit. This month's service will be held on March 19th at 7:30 p.m. Karen would love to see your family and say hello!

And for a physically distanced yet social gathering, consider joining the outdoor Walk Away the Matzoh event on Sunday, March 28th organized by Men's Club. It promotes a family walk, an activity that has become a healthy habit in my home during the pandemic. Plus the kids – and again, their parents – benefit socially and emotionally from seeing each other in person, even masked and from a careful distance.

Nor does that question ever come from the gutte neshuma who, especially during this last year, have kept our own Temple Beth Sholom operating.

Natalie and Rita in the office, and Jose and Santos throughout the building, have kept everything going just like before the 2020 Purim Ball. Rabbi Ballan and Cantor Korobow conduct their Shabbat Services, with a weekly gathering of about 50 to 60 people. 
