From the Rabbi's desk

We made it through another year, and we are now in the period of the Omer, which began the second night of Passover and continues until Shavuot. The Omer, which literally means "a measure," was an offering of the first of the grain or barley harvest, which was brought to the Temple, and continued for seven weeks, until the 50th day, Shavuot. Shavuot is the plural of shavua, literally meaning 'weeks.' The holiday of Shavuot celebrates Israel's receiving the Torah at Sinai.

This year, Shavuot falls on the evening of May 16th. We are going to celebrate a little early this year with Mitzvah Day, Sunday morning, May 16th. I am excited, because the Religious School students will be meeting in person—the first time in more than a year! The event is open to everyone and will be outdoors. The students will help beautify the outside of Temple Beth Sholom by planting flowers, and will be raising money with their walkathon. We are also holding a food and toy drive. Please bring non-perishable (and expired) food and toiletries to Temple and/or an unwrapped children's toy. The food will be donated to Commonpoint Queens (formerly the Samuel Field Y), and the toys will be donated to The River Fund.

April Board of Trustees Meeting

The Board of Trustees met on Monday, April 12^{th} , 2021 via videoconferencing (Zoom) due to COVID-19 restrictions.

President Joy Bobrow reported her hopes that we may be able to have in-person services for the High Holidays or before. She reported on progress regarding the PPP loan. Eric Lustig and Louis Fevola will begin to install wiring to improve videoconferencing for Zoom services. She thanked Ilyne Rabinowitz for her presentation at Adult Education and to Eric Bernstein for moderating it. March minutes were accepted with corrections. Robin Myers, Financial Secretary, reported membership is currently 113 member units and said dues statements will be sent by month's end to anyone who still has an outstanding balance, unless a payment plan is in place.

The March financial report will be reviewed next month.

Rabbi Ballan reported on recent and upcoming services and on Religious School events, Saturday morning Torah study, and on all the other activities and services TBS is providing via Zoom. Cantor Korobow agreed with Rabbi.

Parents' Association Co-President Elana White reported on upcoming fundraiser at Pesso's Ices & Ice Cream on June $3^{\rm rd}$ from 6:00 - 8:00 pm. PA will host Family service on May $14^{\rm th}$. New president(s) will be formally elected this Sunday, April $18^{\rm th}$.

Andrea Odintz, Religious School Board Committee Chair, reported on moving the date of Mitzvah Day to May 16th and planned activities for that. Closing Exercises will be outdoors on June 13th (weather permitting).

Barbara Gandelman, Sisterhood President, reported on upcoming events: Bingo game on April $21^{\rm st}$, Book Club on May $26^{\rm th}$ reading *Forget Russia* by L.B. Williams – with the author present. Rummage sale will be on Monday, Memorial Day May $31^{\rm st}$. Women's Discussion Group will be held on April $14^{\rm th}$, facilitated by Deirdre Weliky.

President Joy Bobrow, Use of Building, reported the Queens Oratorio Society is interested in returning to the building.

Jim Kettig, House Committee Chair, reported the first phase of a required Triennial Report on the condition of the main boiler is completed with the heating and plumbing section pending.

Jeff Cohen, Men's Club President, reported on upcoming Mitzvah Day activities and on the "Book Room." Hopefully with more COVID vaccines, they plan for the return of monthly bowling by the summer.

Deirdre Weliky, Caring Committee Chair, reported things have been quiet this month.

President Bobrow reported the next Food Pantry is scheduled for April 20^{th} and if anyone is aware of someone who is food-insecure they can be directed to it.

Ilyne Rabinowitz, Social Action Committee, reported on the blanket and sock drive in March and that the blankets will be delivered to a Women's Shelter and the socks to Street Life Ministries. That committee is in need of additional members.

Gail Tishcoff reported the next Blood Drive will be on May 2^{nd} from 9:30 am – 3:30 pm in the ballroom.

Barry Packer, Ways and Means, reported on the success of the recent "Pizza Before Pesach" event and on the upcoming (virtual) Zoom cabaret living room concert with Renee Katz with piano accompaniment by John Cook which is scheduled for Saturday April 17th. There will be a \$20.00 admission donation in order to get the Zoom link.

Eric Bernstein, Adult Education Committee Chair, thanked Ilyne Rabinowitz and Ed Friedman (Stay-At-Home Solutions) for their lecture on Community Healthcare needs. Mollie Galchus will discuss the "Great American Songbook" and the composers, artists, and Jewish aspects of the collection on April 25th.

Joy Bobrow, Bazaar Co-Chair, briefly discussed the future of Bazaar.

Geri Weiss thanked all for participating in Passover Chocolate sales and said it raised \$235.00 for the Religious School.

Thank you to all the families who have made the past two Shared Shabbat services with Karen Feit on Zoom a success. An improvement we have made is to seek commitments of attendance so we can offer specific readings to students in advance. Everyone wins this way; the kids know what is expected, and no time is spent waiting for volunteers during the service. Please plan to join the next Shared Shabbat on May 28th, and you can see for yourselves how much our children have learned and are capable of when participating in a service!

While Zoom has been great to keep learning and observing and stay connected during this pandemic, the shared experience of in-person gatherings has not been forgotten. With spring here and the weather getting warmer–as well as more adult members getting vaccinated –the Religious School Board is planning an outdoor (weather permitting), in-person Mitzvah Day in lieu of Zoom classes on Sunday morning, May 16th. If the weather is rainy, we will spread out in the ballroom with the room's new windows open.

Either way, we are seeking donations for a Food Drive and a Toy Drive. Food can be canned, boxed or otherwise store-packaged; they must be sealed and not beyond expiration dates. 

Cantor's Corner

You all know how involved I am in making music. For many years, I've been heavily into what is now called roots music. In rough terms, that can cover folk, blues, bluegrass, country, old-timey, rockabilly, early rock, maritime (sea chanteys, etc.), some jazz, klezmer, and gospel, to name just a few. What I've always loved about these traditional forms of music is that they are essentially "homemade." Largely unschooled, non-professional music makers developed these types of music to entertain, console and engage themselves, and those around them.

Over the course of the last five decades, I've always continued to play this sort of music regardless of my other involvements (work, family, school). The music has been, and is, endlessly rewarding. In recent years, there hasn't been much traditional music to be found on Long Island, so almost 10 years ago, I started venturing back into New York City (primarily Manhattan and Brooklyn) to get my "fix."

There is a tremendous number of things going on in Brooklyn-young bluegrass musicians, some excellent old-timey players, and of course, a lot of alternative sorts of rock and roll. A substantial number of venues feature live music.

In Manhattan, I hooked up again after many years with members of the Pinewoods/NY Folk Music Society. These are folks who have long been very devoted to traditional folk music forms. What struck me was how much older the group (and I) had become. No new, young members? Very, very few it seemed. Someone in the group invited me to an event on a Sunday evening on Manhattan's lower east side, "Exceedingly Good Song Night." Of course, the name intrigued me, and I had no choice but to go.

I arrived at 7:00 pm on the appointed Sunday at a real dive bar at the corner of Avenue C and 9th Street (not a neighborhood I would have ventured into in the 1960s). Pretty soon, dozens of people were crowded into the tiny room. Running the event was a young man named Ken Schatz, an actor, acting teacher/coach, and excellent traditional singer. It turned out to be a fascinating evening, with many songs in many styles being sung. Most of the singers brought no accompaniment, so I spent much of my time providing backup (something I really love to do). The venues changed over time, but the event continued.

"Exceedingly Good Song Night" occurs once each month, and I've gone out of my way to make it to many of them over the years. And now, due to COVID, the event has been happening via Zoom. I really like Ken and the other older "folkies" who often make it to the event. But the real reason I'm taken by this gathering is that Ken has many young acting students (largely college age and over) who have regularly made this a part of their monthly schedule. And, what's happening is that THEY ARE BEING EXPOSED TO AND LEARNING THE OLD SONGS! It's a fantastic thing. They're hearing material that many have never heard before.

Then they're doing the research not only to learn these old tunes, but also to find out where they come from, what they mean, and to whom they were important and meant something.

So, largely because of Ken's infectious enthusiasm and rather extensive sphere of influence, along with some pretty good music making by some of us "old folkies," these "kids" are picking up the ball and running with it. Maybe roots music does have a future. So, what is the lesson for the day?

Who is within your sphere of influence? Who wants to know what you're into, what makes you happy, and what turns you on? What am I talking about? Why, now I'm talking about Temple Beth Sholom. In order to get excited about our wonderful congregation, folks have to know that we exist, what we do, and what we have to offer.

Do you know someone who's just moved into the area? Do you have friends who are unaffiliated, who are unhappy where they currently belong, or are just curious? Share the wealth that is Temple Beth Sholom. It would be great to get in lots of young people like at the folk music night I mentioned. But it would also be wonderful to bring people back to temple life, affiliation, and Jewish connection. Just like with roots music, for our "roots" to survive, they must be nourished, watered, and nurtured. We hope that the Tree of Life that is Torah and Jewish congregational life in general will be here long after we are gone. Our congregational roots are, in the truest sense, "homemade." Someone will have to tend to them. Let's start recruiting those future "old timers" now.


