From the Rabbi's desk

Shalom!

By the time you read this, the holidays will be over, even though right now as I am writing, it is the day after Yom Kippur. This year October coincides with the Hebrew month of Cheshvan. also known 'Marcheshvan' or 'sad Cheshvan.' The rabbis coined this name because it is the only month in which there are no Jewish holidays. I believe that 'Marcheshvan' is a euphemism—the rabbis were not really all that sad that there are no holidays in Cheshvan! This goes double for me this year. It has been challenging to say the least—we had services in-person, but also on Zoom. And I think all went extremely well. We are so fortunate to have this technology now, and I thank all those who helped make it possible, from the bottom of my heart. It took a lot of work to make this happen. Never in my wildest dreams did I ever think that my former iob experience media/technology would ever have anything to do with the rabbinate. We certainly did not have any Zoom courses in rabbinical school! We are living in a new age.

Marcheshvan gives us time to breathe a little. We truly begin again as we start reading the Torah from Bereisheet, which is always exciting. After everything is over, after we have made amends and have forgiven, we start fresh.

It is a little ironic that at the same time we are learning about creation and re-birth, outside the leaves are turning colors, and the earth is getting ready for the dormant winter. Maybe that is intentional. Life and death are always around us, reminding us how fragile life is.

We don't need to wait for the Holidays for renewal, however. Each day gives us an opportunity. Our daily prayers begin with a blessing for the renewal of our souls. "Elohai neshamah, shenata bi t'hora hi. My God, the soul you have given me is pure. We wake up with a clean slate, and another chance. In a midrash from Tanna devei Eliyahu Zuta (1:5) we learn, "Every day a person is formed by God, every day a person is born; every day a person lives, every day a person dies; every day a person's soul is taken from them (during sleep) and deposited with the soul's True Owner; every day a person is fed out of the fruit of their deeds, just as the infant is fed out of their mother's breast."

One of the ways I experience renewal is by learning new things. And this year, I have learned so much! I hope you take advantage of learning something new or taking on a new ritual or mitzvah. October brings back our weekly evening healing and meditative service on Tuesdays at 7:30 pm—if you are not a regular, I encourage you to try it.

All services are now scheduled to be hybrid; in-person and Zoomed, unless otherwise indicated below. Saturday Torah Study/Morning Shabbat Services will be Zoomed until further notice. Shabbat honors can be performed via Zoom.

From The President

Dear Temple Family,

As I write this article, it is Sukkot! We had wonderful High Holy Day Services and I want to send a heartfelt thank you to the Rabbi and Cantor for them. Gail Tischcoff's amazing flute playing, Renee Katz-Packer's lovely voice and Ronna Galchus beautiful piano playing were so inspiring! And of course, Jennifer Schecter Lonborg and Adam Galchus blowing shofar was absolutely incredible.

It was wonderful to see so many temple members in-person as well as on Zoom. What a way to start the New Year!

For those of you who were unable to attend the Rosh Hashanah morning services, and consequently did not hear my remarks, I am going to include a portion of them as my article as I believe they bear repeating. So here goes:

Last year, when we gathered for the High Holy Days, it was only via Zoom. This year, I am so happy to be standing before you in person as the President of this incredible Temple Beth Sholom Family.

It is great to see so many faces in person as well as on Zoom, for those of you that who are uncomfortable gathering indoors at this time.

It has been an incredible year and our Temple family is blessed to have been largely spared from the COVID pandemic; while several members have had the virus, and are still suffering from some lingering side effects, we are all basically healthy and for that we are thankful.

There are so many Temple members who have been helping behind the scenes so that we can continue to have a warm, vibrant community, hosting Zoom services, adult education events, sisterhood events and as important, Zoom Religious and Hebrew school.

We continue to remain a community.

So many synagogues have been merging and closing their doors, that I sometimes fear that when Jews are seeking to take part in Jewish customs and traditions, they will have no place to go! September Board of Trustees Meeting

The Board of Trustees met on Monday, September 13, 2021 via videoconferencing (Zoom).

President Joy Bobrow thanked the Membership Committee for the lovely Open House in August. It was wonderful to have more than 40 people in the ballroom and sanctuary.

She thanked Rabbi Ballan and Cantor Korobow for the recent Rosh Hashana services and especially thanked Eric Lustig, Geri Weiss and Larry Gold for their hard work and technical supports.

She thanked Jeffrey Cohen for donating a tent to use for outdoor services including the upcoming Yom Kippur Children's service. She requested to be copied on Temple correspondence so that she can be aware of plans and committee concerns.

The minutes of the last meeting were accepted with corrections. Robin Myers, Financial Secretary, reported membership remains at 109 family units and statements will be sent at the end of the month.

Rabbi Ballan reported on current and upcoming High Holiday services. We hope to purchase a portable sound system after the holidays thanks to the generosity of Larry Gold in memory of his mother, Margot. She extended thanks to all who have worked so hard to make the High Holiday services so successful and accessible. Cantor Korobow thanked all for their patience and forbearance during this time of change and transition. He said he thinks the Rabbi's strategy of sharing Selichot services with other temples via Zoom is a good one.

Geri Weiss, Pulpit and Ritual Committee Chair, reported High Holiday services are going well and the in-person and Zoom attendance is about the same as last year which was all Zoom.

Elaine Larkin, PA Co-President, reported they enjoyed their first in-person meeting yesterday in the playground and we had a very good turnout. They hope to meet inperson as often as possible.

Andrea Odintz, School Board Committee Chair, reported Religious School started Sept. 12th in- person in the ballroom. They plan to have Family Education once a month when parents are invited to remain and participate. She reported Danielle Gandelman has started to work as a teacher's assistant. Hebrew School will start later, on October 6th, due to how the High Holidays fall. Those classes will be via Zoom so that students and instructors can be un-masked to facilitate language acquisition. Shared Shabbat services will resume with Karen Feit on October 1st. The Parents' Association has generously agreed to pay half of her fee.

Vice President Dr. Fay Schildkraut, Membership Chair, reported there was a lovely turnout for the Open House thanks to Membership Committee and TBS members who turned up. All four new member units came in-person. The Board approved two new member units, Sarah Lotfi-Hene (and children Noah & Theodore) and Margaret Pasach (returning member).

Barbara Gandelman, Sisterhood President, reported the August auction was successful, and proceeds were \$547.00. Sisterhood paid for printing of the Healing Service for Yom Kippur. Bingo has been running for a year and will continue on October 20th at 7:30. Book Club will be on November 14th, reading *Beyond the Ghetto Gates* By Michelle Cameron via Zoom, with the author present. The next Women's Discussion Groups will be Wednesday, October 6th and November 3rd, facilitated by Deirdre Weliky.

President Joy Bobrow reported on Use of Building that the Queens Oratorio Society has resumed rehearsals in the ballroom. Jubilee Church has a new 2-year contract effective October $1^{\rm st}$, 2021 contract. They will be using two upstairs classrooms, removing the wall between them to create one large space. They will be modernizing the upstairs bathroom

Jim Kettig, House Committee Chair, reported Repairs on the boiler were completed and it passed the required combustion test. He reported we are appealing the DEP's decision to not give final approval due to an under-sized louver in the boiler room. This louver has always been in place, and we believe it should be "grandfathered." Some of the supports suspending gas lines from the cellar ceiling need modifying, per the initial report from Local Law 152. He provided more detail on meeting with prospective contractors and engineers regarding a major cooling/ heating systems overhaul.

Jeff Cohen, Men's Club President, reported a planned Veteran's Day event on Friday Nov. 12th, in collaboration with Temple Gates of Prayer. Bowling has resumed.

Dierdre Weliky reported the Caring Committee sent condolence card to Debra Leffe on the passing of her mother.

Barry Packer, Ways & Means Committee Chair, reported on replay of Renee's show in November.

Eric Bernstein reported on Adult Education lecture on December 12th, 2021 by Chuck Weinstein of the Jewish Genealogy Society of Long Island.

The Board unanimously approved a motion for a 3-year contract with Building Custodian Jose Urbina from October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2024.

Religious School News

Now that we are back into the swing of our new fall school schedules, it's time to introduce Hebrew classes back into the mix. Morah Ruth or Morah Beth will be in touch with the exact time of your child's Zoom group, which will still occur late Wednesday afternoons. The first day of Hebrew lessons will be on October 6th.

Please note that while Sunday's Religious School classes are taking place in person in TBS' enormous ballroom – with the space to distance and new windows that open for safe ventilation – Hebrew School will remain on Zoom. This is largely due to the challenges of learning a language while wearing masks. In addition, the smaller-group format that we started on Zoom last year proved to be successful, so we are sticking with it for now.

Meanwhile, holding Religious School in the ballroom – or outdoors, as we did for our back-to-back Sukkot-themed Sundays in September – gives us the opportunity to be flexible. We can keep the one-room-schoolhouse format that we began on Zoom for certain themes, use tall room dividers when working solely with different age groups, and open the space to invite students' parents to join their children for monthly Family Education programs. A schedule of those monthly dates and topics will be heading your way shortly, if it hasn't already

Traditionally, Religious School students have joined Sunday classes weekly through the 7th grade, even while studying with the Rabbi for B'nei Mitzvah. Jewish education doesn't magically stop at age 12 or 13. The School Board hopes that your family will continue to honor this tradition and continue to make attending classes a priority.

We hope to reinstate our teachings of doing mitzvot regularly – not only on Mitzvah Day -- by helping others in safe ways in a world impacted by COVID. This was a big part of our Academy classes in the past, which had become more difficult recently. We hope your family will join us on this meaningful journey that no one is ever too old to experience.

Please also join us for our monthly Shared Shabbat service, which will continue to be led by Karen Feit. The first of this new year is scheduled for Friday, October 1st at 7:30 p.m., on Zoom as of this writing. This year we are taking attendance and noting participation, as both are student requirements. Remember, the more our children participate in services, the more comfortable and confident they will be on the bimah for their B'nei Mitzvah – and throughout their lives. A Bar or Bat Mitzvah is not the end of the journey, but a milestone in Jewish education. Let's continue learning together.

If the translation holds true, the people within our vicinity should be happier, stronger and more victorious than ever; as the remnants of Ida's September $1^{\rm st}$, 2021 visit have created an indelible long-term impact, felt by our community and, especially by members of our Temple Beth Sholom family and their families.

Yet, because we are one family, nobody has been left to feel alone. Rabbi Ballan's job description is far from only 9:00-5:00; as she is *always* there to answer the call. And, Deirdre Weliky, who oversees the Caring Committee does just that. For a self-created acronym of CARING---Compassionate, Attentive, Reassuring, Interested, Nurturing, Giving--could not be more appropriate than what has been displayed; not just with this storm, but, especially over the last few years.

With apprehension and unsureness mounting on even the basic day-to-day situations, Rabbi Ballan and the Caring Committee have been there. So when the basement in my inlaws' home was literally decimated by Ida, there was Rabbi Ballan and the Caring Committee doing what they do best; with phone calls, advice, calming words, and simply just caring.

Which was reflective in the voicemail message I received from my father-in-law two days after Ida. With an incomprehensible amount of mayim having made its way up from the basement to two steps short of the main floor, Isidore said the day was great, The contractor) and plumber were there, Con Edison turned his electricity on, Spectrum got his television working, and Rabbi Ballan reached out to see if they needed anything and made sure that they were ok, and they were getting ready to have a wonderful dinner.

And, in the way the Caring Committee does what it does best; so does my Holocaust-surviving father-in-law, in putting all of life in perspective. As my machatunim were speaking on Erev Rosh Hashanah, Isidore said to my father, Marty, "I see my entire life and everything I worked so hard for in trash bags on the sidewalk in front of my house that I can almost reach out and touch it. What can I do about it---I'm just going to start all over again and start new from the beginning."

Just as we all will do for 5782, with hope for good health, happiness—and maybe a rainbow after the mayim.

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


