Shalom!

Sukkot in December? Chanukah at Thanksgiving? Making Sense of the Calendar

"November comes early this year!" You don't often hear people comment on the secular calendar this way, but for some reason the Jewish holidays are either late or early. They are never on time! This year, just as soon as we finish our turkey dinners on Thanksgiving, we have to finish wrapping our presents and start peeling the potatoes for latkes, because the first night of Chanukah falls on Sunday, November 28, just a few days later.


You might think that Chanukah has nothing to do with Thanksgiving, but maybe it does. We have all heard about the miracle of the oil that lasted eight days instead of one, when the Maccabees first entered the Temple and set out to restore and purify the sanctuary after they defeated the Greek-Syrian army.

But the story of the oil is nowhere to be found in any of the four Books of Maccabees (which are not a part of the Hebrew Bible) that provide us much of the historical with information concerning the Maccabean revolt of which we know today. II Maccabees is a summary of a history written originally in Greek for Hellenistic Jews living in the Diaspora in the Greek-speaking areas of Egypt.1 We learn in II Maccabees. 10:5-8:

"The sanctuary was purified on the twenty-fifth of Kislev, the same day of the same month as that on which foreigners had profaned it. The joyful celebration lasted for eight days. It was like the Feast of Tabernacles, for they recalled how, only a short time before, they had kept that feast while they were living like wild animals in the mountains and caves; and so they carried garlanded rods branches with their fruits, as well as palm fronds, and they chanted hymns to the One who had so triumphantly achieved purification of God's own Temple. A measure was passed by the public assembly, which stated that the entire Jewish nation should celebrate these days every year."1

Therefore, the eight days of Chanukah were really a reenactment of the eight days of Sukkot! Sukkot, as we know, is our fall harvest festival. We give thanksgiving to God for our bountiful harvest, and express our gratitude for all we are given. It is a little known fact that the thought Pilgrims, to have originated Thanksgiving, based their observance partly on the holiday of Sukkot. A deeply religious people, they looked frequently to the Bible to guide them. What better way celebrate their survival and their harvest than to model it after Sukkot?

September Board of Trustees Meeting

The Board of Trustees met on Monday, October 11, 2021 via Zoom.

President Joy Bobrow reminded the Board about the Congregational Meeting on October 27th, and that we have two Bar Mitzvot this coming weekend – Aaron White (in person) and Benjamin Rosenberg (via Zoom). She thanked Rabbi Ballan for working with them and wished both families Mazel Tov. She thanked Geri Weiss for taking responsibility for changing the Torah covers for the High Holidays and bringing them to the dry cleaners.

The minutes of the last meeting were accepted with corrections. Robin Myers, Financial Secretary, reported membership has increased by three to 112 member units. Rabbi Ballan reported on the recently concluded High Holiday Services and on upcoming B'nei Mitvot. Attendance has continued to be good for services and for Shabbat Morning Torah Study. She thanked everyone who has worked so hard to make our programming and services run smoothly, to Cantor Korobow, and especially to our new 'tech' committee—Eric Lustig, Larry Gold & Geri Weiss.

Cantor Korobow submitted his remarks via email and reported on the High Holiday Services, Children's Services, and on Religious and Hebrew School progress. Both Rabbi and Cantor reminded the Board to try to attend the upcoming Bar Mitzvah Services this weekend.

Geri Weiss, Pulpit and Ritual Committee Chair, reported High Holiday Services went well with about even split in attendance via in-person and Zoom. She requested volunteers who are comfortable with technology to assist in the ongoing Zoom production for services from the sanctuary.

Erica Bernstein, PA Co-President, reported the Pizza in the Hut event was well attended. A check for \$450.00 was received by Temple to cover half of Karen Feit's salary for the school year.

Andrea Odintz, School Board Committee Chair, reported on the progress of Religious School and Hebrew School, as well as the plans for Family Education once a month when parents are invited to remain and participate. She reported on the recent Shared Shabbat, which was so well attended that Karen Feit needed to add parts for students who wanted to participate. Accommodations for the use of Ballroom will be made on the Sundays that Rummage and the Blood Drive are scheduled.

Vice President Dr. Fay Schildkraut, Membership Chair, reported on the proposal to add a Virtual Membership category. The Board passed a motion to continue to explore this option and to provide additional details so that the Board and Congregation can review it and appropriate amendments, if needed, to the by-laws can be proposed and discussed. This can hopefully be done in advance of the January Congregational meeting so that if it is agreed, we can have it in place for the beginning of our fiscal year, which starts in February.

Barbara Gandelman, Sisterhood President, reported the Paid-Up event will be this Wednesday, October 13th. Temple member, Karla Bonne will lead us in a night of art.

The fee will be \$10. Virtual Bingo will resume on Wednesday, October 20th at 7:30. Book Club will be on November 14th, via Zoom, reading *Beyond the Ghetto Gates* by Michelle Cameron, with the author present. The next Women's Discussion Group will be Wednesday, November 3rd, facilitated by Deirdre Weliky. Rummage Sale will be on November 2nd. Set-up will be on Sunday, October 31st. Please volunteer for set-up and the event.

The Board nominated and then elected the following five members for the Nominating Committee: Iris Bass, Erica Bernstein, Jim Kettig, Maxine Simon, and Geri Weiss. The additional six members of this committee will be elected at the October 27th Congregational Meeting. All Officers and five Trustees will need to be nominated as a slate for presentation to the Board in December and to the Congregation for vote at the January Congregational Meeting.

President Joy Bobrow reported on Use of Building. Jim Kettig, House Committee Chair, reported the boiler recently passed the city inspections and we don't have to test it again for another year. We continue to pursue completion of work on the gas system required by Local Law 152. We also continue to develop a scope of work and budget for major work to the heating and cooling systems.

Jeff Cohen, Men's Club President, reported they are organizing a dinner at Ben's Deli and movie event (to see the new James Bond movie) for Saturday October 30th as well as a Veteran's Day event on Friday November 12th, in collaboration with Temple Gates of Prayer. He reported the current count of sorted books is 18,000.

Deirdre Weliky reported the Caring Committee sent New Year cards to about 20 older TBS members. Get well cards were sent to Rita and Betty.

Marchel Gillin reported the Food Pantry served 1,417 people and 479 households this past month.

llyne Rabinowitz, Social Action Committee Chair, reported they are working on a community outreach project to raise money and provide needed goods to children less fortunate, hoping to partner with the Met Council. They will plan a T-shirt design competition among the school children to sell and raise funds for this project, hoping to present this to the classes on Sunday October 24th.

Barry Packer, Ways & Means Committee Chair, reported on replay of Renee's show on November 13^{th} .

Eric Bernstein reported on Adult Education lecture presentation on December 12th by Chuck Weinstein of the Jewish Genealogy Society of Long Island on Jewish naming practices and tombstone interpretation.


"Beyond the Ghetto Gates"

When French troops occupy the Italian port city of Ancona, freeing the city's Jews from their repressive ghetto, it unleashes a whirlwind of progressivism and brutal backlash as two very different cultures collide. Meanwhile, Francesca, a devout Catholic, must decide if she will honor her marriage vows to an abusive and murderous husband when he enmeshes their family in the theft of a miracle portrait of the Madonna.

Set during the turbulent days of Napoleon Bonaparte's Italian campaign (1796–97), Beyond the Ghetto Gates is both a cautionary tale for our present moment, with its rising tide of anti-Semitism, and a story of hope—a reminder of a time in history when men and women of conflicting faiths were able to reconcile their prejudices in the face of a rapidly changing world.



Scoop's Schmooze

As I recently browsed through my archives of Schmoozes, October or November was around the time of year that my contributions to The Voice were all authored with the theme for each being the second, third and fourth annual Chicken Soup Cook-Off. Due to obvious reasons, the most recent article on this topic was in the autumn of 2019. And for those same reasons, we hope and pray that after a two-year hiatus, the Fifth Annual Chicken Soup Cook-Off will be just over a year away, on Saturday night, November 12th, 2022.

There were also many other vendors who were integral pieces who, unfortunately and sadly over the last couple of years, we have witnessed being shuttered including Ben's Best, The Skyline Diner, The Terrace Diner, Anthony's, Tropical Revival, and Buddy's. And, within the last year we were faced with the loss of one of the Chicken Soup Cook-Off's most ardent supporters—local journalist, Merle Exit, who always eagerly showed up attired in her festive chicken hat.

And, while we are missing walking in to our ballroom during the second Saturday in November; minus the essence and aroma of a wide array of delectable chicken soups from all corners of the earth wafting through the building, there will be soup available during the first weekend in December for Bazaar.

Yes, that is the time that our own culinary connoisseur, Chef Adam Gandelman, among other things, will be making his butternut squash soup, using the home-grown butternut squash from the garden of my in-laws, Isidore and Rose Katz.

When those squash were beginning to be harvested a couple of months ago, one of my father-in-law's biggest concerns was making sure there were enough of them set aside for Temple to use for Bazaar; which implored Adam to respond, "We really want to use them because it makes the soup a bit more special."




