

From the Rabbi's desk

As usual, I must submit my article a few weeks before The Voice is published. It is the middle of the Hebrew month of Av. and we have just observed Tisha B'Av, the commemoration of the destruction of the 1st and 2nd Temples in Jerusalem. But there is another "holiday" in Av, Tu B'Av, the 15th of Av, which falls smack in the middle of the month. The moon is full. The days are hot. This is the "Jewish day of love," similar to Valentine's Day. How did this come to be? This date usually coincides with the Torah portion, Vaetchanan, which includes the Sh'ma V'ahavta. where we commanded to love God. The custom of celebrating Tu B'Av goes back to Mishnaic times (1st -2nd century), as we learn in the Mishnah, "Rabban Shimon ben Gamliel said: 'There were no days as joyous for Israel as the fifteenth of Av and Yom Kippur, for on them the daughters of Jerusalem would go out in white clothes...and dance in the vineyards. What were they saying? 'Young man, consider whom you choose (to be your wife)." (Ta'anit, Chapter 4)

It is interesting that this also was done on Yom Kippur—and Rabban Gamliel considered both Tu B'Av and Yom Kippur the most 'joyous' days. Most of us would not consider Yom Kippur joyous, but it ends positively. In the afternoon Torah reading, we read "V'ahavta l'rei'akha kamokha" (Leviticus 19:18) "Love your neighbor as yourself."

During the time period between Tisha B'Av and the High Holy Days, it is customary to start the process of "cheshbon ha nefesh" of looking inwardly and introspectively. What can we do better? Where have we fallen short? Perhaps the connection of love on both ends, teaches us not to forget to be kind and lovingnot only with others, but with ourselves. I think the words of Israeli poet Yehuda Amichai said it best:

The eve of Rosh Hashana. At the house that's being built a man makes a vow: not to do anything wrong in it,

only to love.

Sins that were green last spring dried out over the summer. Now they're whispering.

So I washed my body and clipped my fingernails,

the last good deed a man can do for himself

while he's still alive.

What is man? In the daytime he untangles into words what night turns into a heavy coil. What do we do to one another a son to his father, a father to his son?...

The eve of Rosh Hashana. At the house that's being built a man makes a vow: not to do anything wrong in it, only to love.

To My Temple Family,

This is September, so we are again getting ready for this year's High Holy Days. As I am sure you know, they are either early, or late; they are never on time!!

We are all eager to welcome everyone back in the sanctuary for our High Holy Days this September. I hope that you will be joining us in the sanctuary, as we gather again in person and truly feel the love of your Temple Family. Of course, through the wonders of technology we will have our services also via Zoom!

We do have much to be thankful for. We remain a place of gathering - we are a community.

We must all remember that supporting a synagogue is a mitzvah and can be done in many ways: volunteering, financially, and of course spiritually. With all that is going on in the world around us, we must show up in larger numbers than ever before; we must never forget.

Ideally, what one gets out of belonging to a synagogue is measured in feelings of love, community, and connection to each other and to the Divine (or to something greater than ourselves).

There must continue to be places of thriving Jewish life and we will be one of those places, with your continued support.

It is so important, especially at this time of year, that we all look deep within ourselves, go that extra mile, and make the effort of being kind and loving to one another. and as generous to our synagogue as possible.



July/August Board of Trustees Meetings

This report includes a report from Jeff Cohen at the last Board of Trustees meeting that he attended. May he rest in peace and may his memory be a blessing.

The Board of Trustees met (briefly) on Monday, July 11^{th} , and Monday, August 8^{th} , 2022, via Zoom.

At the July meeting there were reports only from the President, Financial Secretary, Membership and Pulpit Committees: President Joy Bobrow reported on preliminary plans for High Holy Days.

Robin Myers, Financial Secretary, reported with the passing of Elaine Trachter, we now have 109 member units. Statements will be sent in early August to anyone with an outstanding balance not on a payment plan.

Fay Schildkraut, Membership Committee Chair, presented Harvey Bienstock, whom the Board unanimously approved. She reported some of the conservative temples nearby no longer have schools. The Board agreed to accept non-member children whose parents would need to show proof of membership at another temple. The tuition will be higher than that of TBS members.

At the August meeting, President Bobrow reported Pulpit and Ritual Committee will be meeting next week to discuss and finalize the details for the High Holy Days. She and Rabbi Ballan are hopeful that we will be able to allow vaccinated Temple Members and their families to attend inperson services as we did last year and that masks, while recommended, will be optional. Most likely physical tickets will not be issued, but members will need to RSVP so we have a list of expected attendance.

Robin Myers, Financial Secretary, reported we currently have 110 member units with an outstanding dues balance of \$41,600.

Charlene Metz, Treasurer reviewed the July financial report which was accepted by the Board as presented.

Rabbi Ballan reported both she and Walter recovered from COVID. She and Cantor Korobow are preparing for High Holiday Services. She thanked all who volunteered to lead services this summer. She has begun to contact B'nei Mitzvah students to resume weekly tutoring. She requested those who have family or friends on our Mi shebeyrach list to let her or Natalie know if someone can be removed. Additions need to be added by Thursday to reliably have the name read on Friday. Cantor reported that he and Rabbi are gearing up for the High Holidays. David Close has scheduled the Oratorio's annual Holiday Party for Sunday, December 18th at 4:00 pm and Cantor will be performing Hannukah tunes.

Geri Weiss, Pulpit and Ritual Committee Chair, reported there is a Florida congregation which can donate gender neutral prayer books and she is coordinating with Lee Temares.

Erica Bernstein, Parents' Association Co-President, reported they will be holding their first meeting of the school year on Sunday, September $11^{\rm th}$ with a bagel breakfast at 10:30 am. They will be hosting Pizza in the Hut on Sunday, October $9^{\rm th}$ at 6:00 pm.

She also reported that the first day of Religious School will be in-person Sunday, September 11th. The first day of Hebrew School will be held remotely on Wednesday, September 14th.

Fay Schildkraut, Membership Committee Chair, reported there are some new prospects for membership. The committee is working on the Welcome Back Open House on Friday, September 16th which will include sandwich wraps, fruit, and desserts. This will be free of charge for all who attend, as a way of thanking our members for their support, especially during the last three years.

Barbara Gandelman, Sisterhood President, reported the annual auction took place on August 4th and was well attended. She thanked Iris Bass and Natalie for making sure it ran smoothly, to Fred Alpern, assisted by Adam Gandelman, for auctioneering, and to Geri Weiss for providing desserts. Dues should be sent to Geri Weiss. Virtual Bingo will begin again on September 15th. The Paid-Up Sisterhood Paint Night event will be in-person on Thursday, October 27th at 7:30 pm. Saturday morning Painting in the Park events have been held and she thanked Lori Lustig and Geri Weiss for organizing this.

Joy Bobrow reported on Use of Building that the Oratorio Society will be starting up their rehearsals in the ballroom in September, just before the High Holy Days. The new ballroom windows are working out splendidly, keeping noise down to a minimum.

Jim Kettig, House Committee Chair, reported we are working with a new potential contractor for the overhaul of HVAC systems and anticipate ballpark pricing from him this week. If that is reasonable, we will start in earnest the next steps in the process such as soliciting bids for asbestos investigation and engineering services to produce the drawings necessary for bid, filing, and construction. He noted that due to the high costs of maintaining our current equipment, we understand the need to move forward toward new systems.

Jeff Cohen, Men's Club Co-President, reported Men's Club monthly bowling continues at Jib Lanes in Flushing. Next dates are Thursday, September 1 and Thursday, October 6 for two games (shoes included) for only \$15. Masks mandates may still be in effect for bowlers. The Book (and Media) Room already has 16,000 pre-sorted books (and hundreds of DVDs and CDs) for Bazaar 2022, scheduled for December 3-4, 2022. Men's Club is seeking speakers for the annual Veterans Day breakfast.

Deirdre Weliky, Caring Committee Chair, reported condolence and get-well cards were sent out. Check- in calls were made to some congregants. The Women's Discussion group resumes on September $21^{\rm st}$ and the Adult Discussion Group resumes on October $24^{\rm th}$.

Joy Bobrow reminded everyone that the monthly food pantry is available to those who are food insecure. Anyone can register in-person at the food pantry with ID.

Scoop's Schmooze

With the High Holidays just around the corner; one month hence will put us right between Passover 2022 and Pesach 2023. And, as we reflect upon gathering around the Seder table, ponder some of the songs that emanate from the mouths of family and friends who get together---L'Shana Haba'ah, Adir Hu, Dayenu, and Chad Gadya.

Chad Gadva---One Little Goat.

Or G.O.A.T. As in Greatest Of All Time.

In many cases said term may be used loosely and too frequently. However, while some of it is opinion-based-like everyone's Mount Rushmore of the four best of this or greatest at that, there are some whose greatness is unquestionable and undeniable. And, sadly, between this July 30th and August 2nd the world lost three elder GOATS.

While one was of Irish descent and two were African-American, all three actually had strong ties to Judaism.

Bronx-born sportscaster Vin Scully passed away at age 94 on August $2^{\rm nd}$. A multi-faceted announcer, he was most renowned for his time with the Brooklyn/Los Angeles Dodgers, from 1950 until his retirement in 2016. Then Scully covered numerous Hall of Famers including Brooklyn-raised Sandy Koufax, who was originally known more for basketball than baseball. As a teenager Koufax played hoops for the Edith and Carl Marks Jewish Community House of Bensonhurst. Fast forward to the fall of 1965 when Koufax refused to pitch in Game One of the World Series because it fell on Yom Kippur. He also declined to take the ball when games fell on Rosh Hashanah and Passover Seders.

Two days prior to Scully's passing, the greatest winner in all of team sports lost his life at 88 years old. Six-foot-ten Bill Russell, like Scully was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom. He was an Olympic Gold Medal Winner, a two-time NCAA Champion, and with the Boston Celtics he won 11 NBA Championships in 13 years, including eight in a row. When he first arrived in Boston in 1956, he was actually too large to fit in any bed; so a five-foot-seven Zaidie named Israel from Commonwealth Bedding specially created a seven-foot plus bed and mattress to accommodate Russell. Red Auerbach authored the trade to bring Russell to Boston, and then coached him for 10 seasons. Auerbach is a member of the National Jewish Sports Hall of Fame.

And the Hollywood Walk of Fame is where actress Nichele Nichols resides, along with Asteroid 68410 Nichols, named in her honor. Nichols was 89 when she lost her life the day before Russell. And, while she was a multi-dimensional entertainment artist, she is best known for her role of Star Trek's Lieutenant Nyota Uhura, alongside Jewish co-stars William Shatner and Leonard Nimoy; who developed the Vulcan Salute. In the Vulcan Salute, the positioning of the fingers represents the Hebrew letter Shin, which here stands for El Shaddai and Shalom, and is accompanied by the following familiar and meaningful phrase.

So, just like these three GOATS, may we all "live long and prosper."




