

From the Rabbi's desk

We begin this month with Yom Kippur. But after the gates of repentance close, and we hear the last blast of the shofar, we are commanded to immediately build a sukkah, the fragile hut in which the children of Israel lived during their forty years of wandering. Sukkot is my favorite holiday, probably because I get to relax and enjoy nature and experience gratitude for the beauty surrounding me. It enables me to be a little creative with my decorations, and I get to play hostess and invite my friends and family into my temporary home. Sukkot provides us with the opportunity for gratitude, hospitality and to experience nature—all beneficial for healing. Yet our little sukkot are tenuous, and that too reminds us of how vulnerable the world around us is.

Our *sukkot* also remind us of our responsibility and commitment to change our ways with regard to our environment. I recently came back from my niece's wedding in Nevada. I was surprised that a wildfire nearby in California caused smoke to completely cover Lake Tahoe. The beautiful mountains and lake could hardly be seen! I hope that this *Sukkot* holiday encourages you reach out to those in need and work towards protecting our planet.

Why else do I love Sukkot? In each generation we may find different reasons to build our fragile huts. I love Rabbi Lewis John Eron's poem, based on the *Sukkot* song, *"Lama Sukkah Zu"* (Why This Sukkah?).

And here is my real spiel:



Cantor's Corner



Well, here we are again in the midst of the High Holy Days. This is always an extremely busy time in the synagogue schedule-regular, non-lay led services begin, Religious/Hebrew School classes commence, and Selichot, Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot and Simchat Torah are immediately upon us in quick succession! It always feels like the summer was over in a flash.

Last month, I mentioned that I had been booked to play at the Philadelphia Folk Festival after a 50-year hiatus. Yes, you read that right-I last played the Philly Folk Festival in or around 1971-1972. I was very curious to see what it would be like.

In many ways, it was like traveling back in a time machine. It took place on a farm outside of Philadelphia. Many people were camping on the grounds, lots of longhaired, bearded men (now mostly gray haired), alternative women, tie dyed clothes, craft vendors, etc. There were a variety of different stages and performance areas, and people roamed from one to another as they pleased. And, there were tattoos-lots and lots of tattoos.

I played a bit at an 11:30 am concert on Friday, August 19th, the second day of the festival. Not too many people had either woken up or arrived at the grounds at that point. My other appearance was scheduled to take place that same day from 4:00 to 5:00 in the afternoon. In between, Zo and I walked around the grounds, found something to eat, listened to some music, and generally tried to get out of the sun. It was getting hotter and hotter as the day progressed. We ultimately went back to our car and changed into lighter clothes-it was way too hot to be wearing jeans, work boots and a black t-shirt. The switch to shorts, sandals and a light colored t-shirt provided some relief, however brief.

My afternoon set was to take place in a space called the Culture Tent. I arrived there at 3:30 with my lovely wife, my guitar and my banjo. We listened as several musicians were finishing up their set, and began to notice that it was even warmer inside the tent!

Shortly, along with two other performers, I went up to the stage to set up instruments and do a sound check with the sound engineer. And then, it was music time-the three of us onstage did our tunes round robin style-ie. A does a tune, B does a tune, C does a tune, then back to A, etc.

The music went beautifully, and the audience really got into it. But, no one ever thought to roll up the sides of the tent. It got up to 102 degrees Fahrenheit inside the tent! After my first song, sweat was rolling down the front of my guitar!! The person in charge came up to the stage and handed each of us a Turkish face towel to dry ourselves. It was insanely, unbearably hot.

September Board of Trustees Meeting

The Board of Trustees met on Monday September 12th, 2022, via Zoom.

President Joy Bobrow reviewed High Holiday procedures for this year. In lieu of physical tickets, members expecting to attend services will be requested to RSVP to generate a list of expected attendees. Vaccination cards must be on file and masks will be encouraged. She mentioned the upcoming Open House and the successful start this week of Religious School. She acknowledged the tireless efforts of Geri Weiss on behalf of the Religious School while also scheduling High Holiday honors. She thanked the other School Board members, Elaine Larkin, Erica Bernstein, Elana White, Andrea Odintz, and Barbara Gandelman, who will be sharing responsibilities for the school. She reported two of Jeff Cohen's brothers have agreed to run the Book Sale at Bazaar this year in Jeff's memory. She requested Board members assist to help sort. She reported we are on the unofficial list of recipients of the Homeland Security Grant and is following up on a possible hitch that may prevent us from obtaining the funding; she will keep the Board updated

August Minutes were accepted as presented. Robin Myers, Financial Secretary, reported with the passing of Jeff Cohen, we now have 109 member units. The August Financial Report was reviewed and approved by the Board as presented.

Rabbi Ballan, on vacation, emailed her report. She and Cantor are looking forward to the Open House and to High Holidays. She thanked Deirdre Weliky and Cantor for filling in for her this past Shabbat. She has contacted current B'nei Mitzvah students and resumed tutoring. Cantor Korobow reported he and Rabbi have worked out Rosh Hashana services. He gave a hearty "yasher koach" to Dierdre Weliky for leading services on September 9th. He extended the opportunity to any other member who might want to share the Bima for a service. He said Justin White did a great job as a volunteer teacher at vesterday's religious school. Cantor thanked the Tech Crew who has assured all goes well to provide remote services for those at home. Akiva the Believer will be available through the year, and he said David Close may be available on the first Fridays of the month. He may be able to arrange for Gathering Time to join us toward the spring for a Peter Paul and Mary Shabbat service.

Geri Weiss, Pulpit and Ritual Committee Chair, reported the committee is focused on High Holidays.

Elaine Larkin, PA Co-President, reported their first meeting had a good turnout and a possible new family. They honored Jeff Cohen's memory and said they will help with book sort on Sundays when the children are in classes and there are no other meetings. Their first event is Pizza in the Hut on October 9th. Elaine Larkin reported for Religious School and reviewed the current teachers and classes. Students in grades 1-5 will be working with TBS Religious/Hebrew Alumni Student Justin White with a rotation of adults to assist him. The first Shared Shabbat will be this Friday September 16th after the Open House. She invited all to the Children's services during High Holiday services.

Fay Schildkraut, Membership Committee Chair, presented Jeffrey and Gloria Galub and their two children, who live in Florida, as Virtual Affiliates, for the Board's approval. To date 42 have signed up for the Open House. There are 3 potential new families.

Barbara Gandelman, Sisterhood President reported Virtual Bingo will be on Thursday, September 22nd at 8:00 and the annual Paid-Up Sisterhood event is on Thursday, October 27th. The next book club is Sunday, November 20th at 10:30 am via Zoom to discuss The *Push* by Ashley Audrain. See report of Deirdre Weliky, discussion facilitator, below for upcoming Women's and Adult Discussion Group dates.

Joy Bobrow reported on Use of Building that she plans to send out an introductory letter to our neighbors to inform them about our commitment to the local community. She hopes to ease one neighbor's ongoing complaint to the police whenever we have events in the ballroom. The police continue to come, and they verify that sound does not leak outside the lobby. She updated the Board on efforts to coordinate use of the ballroom with Temple Gates of Prayer, which is starting to have more events in person. We continue to require proof of (COVID) vaccination and recommending masks.

Eric Bernstein reported on the new Men's Club slate of officers: President: Andrew Larkin, 1st Vice-President (Treasurer): Eric Lustig; 2nd Vice-President (Recording Secretary): Jason Ehrlich. By-Laws have been reviewed and re-created and have been ratified by attendees. Men's Club will be ordering a name plate for Jeff Cohen for the Men's Club Past President board. Men's Club will carry on supporting temple and Jeff's duties by performing book sorts on a regular basis including Sundays when there are not Men's Club and PA meetings. They are planning the Veteran's Day Breakfast program and Veteran's Day Service. Bowling is still in session for the first Thursday of the month.

Deirdre Weliky, Caring Committee Chair, reported a number of condolence cards were sent and check-in calls were made to some congregants. The Women's Discussion group resumed on September 21st; upcoming dates are October 19th, and November 16th. The Adult Discussion Group continues on Monday, October 24th and December 19th.

Joy Bobrow reported the next food pantry is on September 20th. Ilyne Rabinowitz, Social Action Committee Chair, reported they collected goods for the Forestdale "Family closet." The organization distributes clothes, household items, personal hygiene items, etc. to families in need. She thanked all who have donated. Volunteers are needed to help sort and deliver the goods collected. At times Forestdale seeks volunteers for events such as preparing back packs for back to school and the committee will communicate any requests to interested members.

Scoop's Schmooze

Around this time, seven years ago, I got a call from Temple Beth Sholom Board Member Sharon Katz saying that the Nominating Committee asked about my interest in becoming a member of TBS's Board of Trustees; to which my enthusiasm was boundless. Approximately one year later, then President, Adam Gandelman, asked me, on the cusp of our First Annual Chicken Soup Cook-Off, if I would address the congregation on Yom Kippur morning. I was more than honored and privileged.

That evolved into my annual Kol Nidre address; which happened every ensuing High Holiday season, except for last year, including 2020, which was Zoomed from our dining room. This year, Renee and I are still being extra cautious to protect those around us, and we will be Zooming our High Holiday Services from home; thus, my address will be delivered to you, my Temple Family, emailed by Natalie around Kol Nidre.

As I wrote in last month's Schmooze, with the 5783 High Holidays upon us, we are smack dab between Passover 2022 and Pesach 2023; which had me pondering about my past family Seders. Whether they were large or small, in Boston or New York, and if the service was led by me, or it was my father, father-in-law, or our family-friend Cantor, for as long as I can remember, like a rite of passage, I have always played the part of the Simple Son. To settle my curiosity, I used Google to find out more about this individual whom I portray every spring. I came across an article written in April of 2005 for The Jewish News of Northern California; and surprisingly it said this:

"Of the Haggadah's four sons- the wise, the wicked, the simple and the one who does not know how to ask - consider the tam (the so-called simple son), who is portrayed as a guileless, immature, inexperienced child without much, if any, intellectual capacity.

His naive, innocent question — *Mah zot* (What is this?) — casts him as a simpleton who is led to an uncomplicated answer, appropriate to his unsophisticated level of understanding. However, this portrayal is inaccurate because in all other texts *temimut* (the state of being a tam) is defined as purity and truth, being genuine, unblemished and blameless (Proverbs 10:29) and having integrity (Job 4:6)."

So, as I digress back to that phone call from Sharon, something about being the Simple Son must have rung true. From that inquiry of the Board, to Adam asking me to use my talents as a written and oral communicator, to working under Dr. Fay Schildkraut on the Membership Committee, being Chairman of the Ways & Means Committee and holding Vice-Presidential offices, I am so grateful my parents raised me as they did so I could be distinguished akin to that Simple Son. And, as we head into the most meaningful time on the Jewish calendar, may we all find representation of the Simple Son within each of our hearts and souls, and make the world a better place. L'shanah Tova.

We feel great pride and joy to announce that our son Gavin Levi Kutcher will be called to the Torah, Saturday October $22^{nd} 2022$.




