

In this captivating novel, *New York Times* bestselling author Fiona Davis takes readers into the glamorous lost art school within Grand Central Terminal, where two very different women, fifty years apart, strive to make their mark on a world set against them

For most New Yorkers, Grand Central Terminal is a crown jewel, a masterpiece of design. But for Clara Darden and Virginia Clay, it represents something quite different.

For Clara, the terminal is the stepping stone to her future. It is 1928, and Clara is teaching at the lauded Grand Central School of Art. Though not even the prestige of the school can override the public's disdain for a "woman artist," fiery Clara is single-minded in her quest to achieve every creative success—even while juggling the affections of two very different men. But she and her bohemian friends have no idea that they'll soon be blindsided by the looming Great Depression...and that even poverty and hunger will do little to prepare Clara for the greater tragedy yet to come.

By 1974, the terminal has declined almost as sharply as Virginia Clay's life. Dilapidated and dangerous, Grand Central is at the center of a fierce lawsuit: Is the once-grand building a landmark to be preserved, or a cancer to be demolished? For Virginia, it is simply her last resort. Recently divorced, she has just accepted a job in the information booth in order to support herself and her college-age daughter, Ruby. But when Virginia stumbles upon an abandoned art school within the terminal and discovers a striking watercolor, her eyes are opened to the elegance beneath the decay. She embarks on a quest to find the artist of the unsigned masterpiece—an impassioned chase that draws Virginia not only into the battle to save Grand Central but deep into the mystery of Clara Darden, the famed 1920s illustrator who disappeared from history in 1931.

Adult Education

I am hoping everyone is having a healthy and productive summer so far.

If you were not able to attend the documentary of Chiune Sugihara, there are a number of references that I had collected which you can view below at your leisure.

During the meeting, I provided a slideshow describing the Righteous Among the Nations. Righteous Among the Nations (Hebrew: חֲסִידִי אֲמוֹת הָעוֹלְם, hasidei ummot ha'olam;) "righteous (plural) of the world's nations") is an honorific used by the State of Israel to describe non-Jews who risked their lives during the Holocaust to save Jews, for altruistic reasons, from extermination by the Nazis. The term originates with the concept of "righteous gentiles", a term used in rabbinic Judaism to refer to non-Jews, called ger toshav, who abide by the Seven Laws of Noah.

Persons recognized as a "Righteous Among the Nations" are awarded a specially minted medal bearing their name, a certificate of honor, and the privilege of their names being added to the Wall of Honor in the Garden of the Righteous at Yad Vashem in Jerusalem.

The awards are presented to the rescuers or their next of kin in Israel or in their countries of residence through the good offices of Israel's diplomatic representatives.

Scoop's Schmooze

On Friday, November 18, 2022, Renee and I sat in the second-floor solarium of the Northwell Health Stern Family Center for Rehabilitation with my father-in-law, Isidore; who was admiring the autumn trees out the window from his wheelchair. At that time he shared a very thought-provoking statement. He said "nobody ever dies."

We were perplexed about his phrase. When we asked him what his intended message was; he changed the subject. And, of course, while gazing at the trees, he started talking about his garden. Sadly and heartbreakingly, 34 days later, we were no longer able to ask him what he meant. However, as time has progressed, the connotation of what he said has become logical and clearer.

For as I sit here in my sports den, authoring this summer Schmooze, I look at the top of the apothecary cabinet, where photographs of my mother's mother and father, who left us in 1995 and 1999, respectively, sit atop two dozen Boston sports books. Positioned in between their two pictures is a gift my sister got for Renee and myself---a plaque in the shape of a home that says "And Together They Built A Life They loved." I look at those pictures several times a day, and know that my grandparents are watching over us.

As I fast forward from that November Friday last year to the first and third Sundays of May, 2023 Isidore's belief was there once again. On May 7, at the Jeff Cohen Memorial Softball Game, it is unquestionable that Jeff's presence was there. For the joy and passion that was felt throughout was as it would have been had Jeff been playing. And, two Sundays later, the words that were spoken at the Fred Shapiro Memorial Service revealed that the image that Fred displayed every day was his true wonderful caring self.

In between those two days, on May 11 to be exact, I was tending to Isidore and Rose's garden; which I promised him I would continue his tradition of planting and cultivating. When I began watering, I noticed a bird sitting by the potatoes. The bird made its way, across the edge of the garden, sat under Rose's bedroom window and then carefully, not stepping on any of the rows of plants and seeds, plopped himself down on the compost pile. There, for the next hour, he sat and intently watched; ignoring the water raining down on him.

I took a picture of the bird and we sent it to our friend Liz, who is a bird aficionado, to find out what kind it was. She said it was a mourning dove fledgling. Out of curiosity, I researched mourning dove meaning. LoveToKnow.com was the first Google result to appear and it said this:

The dove's appearance to someone in mourning is often viewed as a visitation from the deceased loved one. The person in mourning senses a message of hope or encouragement from their deceased loved one. Others believe the mourning dove is a messenger sent by angels, spirit guides, or even God.

Truer words have never been spoken---"nobody ever dies."




