

From the Rabbi's desk

We begin this month with the holiday of Sukkot. I have told many of you before that Sukkot is my favorite holiday—I get to enjoy the outdoors, my yard, and the bounty of my own produce that was grown in my little garden. Everything about the holiday reminds me of our connection to the earth and of nature. The sukkah roof needs to be made of natural materials; we must be able to see the stars at night through it. We decorate it with fruits and vegetables; the lulav that we shake is made of date palm, myrtle and willow leaves, and of course an etrog (citron). We celebrate the holiday with all our senses sight, sound, smell, touch and taste.

And vet. our sukkot are intentionally fragile structures. reminding us of how impermanent our lives are. A strong wind or rainstorm can take them down. Torah, on the other hand is a fixture in our lives, giving us support and strength. But a physical Torah is fragile, too. It needs to be handled carefully and taken care of. I hope that you noticed our repaired Sefer Torah during our High Holy Day Services.

Please join us in celebration as we dedicate and put the finishing touches on our Torah with Sofer Neil Yerman on October 22 at 10:00 am. Sofer Yerman will teach us all about how a Torah is made. A celebratory dairy lunch will be served following the program. I hope you all will join us—to participate, celebrate and "be" Torah!

There is another way to "be" Torah, and that is to study. I am planning to offer the wonderful Chai Mitzvah program of guided and self-directed learning. This year there is a new topic—Because We Were Slaves: The Jewish Struggle for Justice in Making America Home. We will meet monthly via Zoom; please e-mail are me if vou interested (rabbi@templebethsholom.org). Times and dates will determined according to the group's schedules. Right now, I am looking at the 3rd or 4th Monday of each month in the evening.

From The President

To My Temple Family,

L'Shana Tovah. I hope everyone had a Happy New Year and an easy fast. We had a wonderful Open House on September 8 and attracted new members with children who will be attending our Religious School. The school is small, but mighty and is something that many of us will strive to ensure will continue. It is something that is needed in the community as there are still many families out there who want a Jewish education for their children!

Unfortunately I was unable to attend the Rosh Hashanah services in person as I was not feeling well and was only able to attend via Zoom.

While watching, it is great to see so many Congregants attended in person. And for those of you who are still currently uncomfortable gathering indoors, or have other mobility and health issues, it was wonderful to see you via Zoom.

As I said last year, there are so many synagogues that have been merging and closing their doors, that I sometimes fear that when Jews are seeking to take part in Jewish customs and traditions, they will have no place to go! That is one of the reasons that I feel so strongly about keeping this Synagogue alive and vibrant. It honestly saddens me that often, after the children of Temple members have their b'nei mitzvah, the families discontinue their membership in Temple.

On an important note, the next Congregational meeting will take place on October 25. At that meeting we will be choosing half of the nominating committee (the other half already having been selected by the Board at its October meeting). This committee is crucial to the future workings of Temple. They select people to fill the trustee and officer positions that will be opening as of February 1, 2024. Please make sure to attend the meeting and consider being part of the all-important process. Coupled with the nominating committee is, of course, who they nominate.

Leadership in any organization is critical. New voices are always welcome so please consider putting you name in the hopper to fill one of the vacancies. While the job may not be easy and fun, it can be rewarding.

In that vein, something I dislike saying is that we cannot hide the fact that synagogues cost money to run. Without membership dues, tuition from religious schools, and donations we simply would not exist. It is our job to support the ongoing expenses of synagogues and not to wash our hands of the obligation. Synagogues also need volunteers to assist in so many endeavors.

With all that is going on in the world today and anti-Semitism so outwardly acceptable, members need to support the most important things in their lives, and we hope that Temple Beth Sholom is one of them. This is the time to show up in larger numbers than ever before.



On a positive note, I'm happily watching my five grandchildren grow, learn and change. Naturally, I think they're all fantastic. But, it's just great to watch them explore, figure things out, find new interests, make new friends, and experience the world.

What's also happening is that each of us, if we're lucky, is ageing. We all know the old adage that "old age isn't for the faint of heart." Roger was just short of his 93rd birthday when he died in August. I miss having the chance to jam with him, improvise, and listen to his ridiculous jokes.

Zo and I went to a music festival in Port Jefferson during the summer where several other old friends were performing. A few seemed very frail. Ah me...time is passing.

On a much happier note, we're heading into another wonderful Temple Beth Sholom season. I look forward to seeing all of you at services, to singing together, and to sharing as the marvelous synagogue family that we are. Don't let time pass you by. It's time to come back and join us in person. See you soon!






