From the Rabbi's desk

"Ben Bag Bag taught: 'Turn it, turn it, for everything is in it." [Pirkei Avot 5:24]

This is a favorite verse of mine from Pirkei Avot, the "Ethics of our Fathers," and not just because of the funny name of the rabbi to whom it is attributed. (Ben Bag Bag, also known as Yochanan ben Bag Bag, lived in the first century B.C.E in Palestine and was a student of Hillel. He is thought to have been a convert to Judaism.). I love this verse, because Ben Bag Bag is referring to the Torah. Some translate the verse: "Study it and review it—you will find everything in it. Scrutinize it, grow old and gray in it; do not depart from it. There is no better portion in life than this."

As I write this, we have not yet had our Torah Repair Siyyum with Sofer Neil Yerman. I know that it will be (was) a wonderful learning experience for everyone, and a chance for us to actually "write" a Torah. I always find that no matter how many times I study the Torah, I always find something new. There is always something to learn. Torah however does not only mean the Five Books of Moses, the Bible, or even the Torah scroll itself, but can refer to all of Jewish tradition and learning. The word "Torah" itself means "teaching."

Formal learning may not be for everyone. It might seem daunting to start a regular practice of Torah study, especially if we are long past our school days. But I encourage you take on a new mitzvah this vear: Join us at TBS and engage in some learning; it's not just for our children. Come to our Healing Service on Tuesday evenings; our Adult Education lectures, and join us for our monthly Chai Mitzvah Class, starting this November 20. We will meet every 3rd or 4th Monday at 7 pm via Zoom. The topic is "Because We Were Slaves: The Jewish Struggle for Justice in Making America Home." Of course, every Saturday morning at 10 am we have a very lively Torah discussion group. There is no need for any previous knowledge of Torah or Hebrew; just come with an open mind, one that is willing to engage with the text. There is no commitment to come every week, just drop in when you can. In addition to learning Torah, we learn even more from each other!

October Board of Trustees Meeting

The Board of Trustees met on Monday, October 9th, 2023. via Zoom.

After Rabbi Ballan's invocation, President Joy Bobrow thanked the Rabbi and Cantor for wonderful High Holiday Services and Geri Weiss for organizing the honors and the Tech Team for managing the technical aspects of the services. She reported on the meeting to develop the Homeland Security Grant. She reminded the Board to attend the upcoming Congregational Meeting on October 25.

Gail Tishcoff, Recording Secretary, presented the September minutes which were accepted.

Robin Myers, Financial Secretary, reported we now have 108 member units. The Board approved the September Financial Report as presented by Treasurer Charlene Metz.

Rabbi Ballan reported on the well-attended High Holiday Services and lovely events, despite being rained out of the Sukkah for "Pizza in the Hut." She reported updated information on how to donate to Israel in the wake of the attacks by Hamas and she shared links. A Chai Mitzvah class is starting November 20 via Zoom on the topic, "Because We Were Slaves: The Jewish Struggle for Justice in Making America Home." Cantor Korobow reported the High Holiday Services went very well and he gave a special thank you to Rabbi Ballan and the Tech team. He encourages everyone to attend the services in person, if possible, as he is working to invite musical guests to play at the services.

Geri Weiss, Pulpit and Ritual Committee Chair reported on the committee's thoughts about the recent High Holiday Services. She provided numbers of attendees in person and on Zoom. She also thanked the clergy and the Tech Team as well as all those who contributed to the services. She described the adjustment to the Mi Shebeirach list and she will bring it to the Congregational Meeting for feedback. In an effort to entice people to attend services in person there will be hors d'oeuvres prior to services on October 20.

Membership Committee Chair Fay Schildkraut presented Fredricka Jane Weinstein, her daughter and granddaughter Marla Tolson and Lena. The Board approved both memberships. Jewish Start class has had an encouraging re-start, thanks to Geri Weiss and Karri Kaufman. Chanukah this year will fall when our children are still in college, and they plan to send them a little reminder that we are thinking of them. At the next committee meeting they will start planning for Shabbat Across America (March 1) and Purim (March 23).

Erica Bernstein, Parents Association Co-President, thanked all who participated and attended in the Children's Services for the High Holidays. "Pizza in the Hut" was celebrated for Sukkot and was celebrated indoors. They are planning a restaurant fundraiser soon. Important Changes Are Expected in January 2024!





Finding Me is a deep reflection, a promise, and a love letter of sorts to self. My hope is that my story will inspire you to light up your own life with creative expression and rediscover who you were before the world put a label on you.

Scoop's Schmooze

Throughout time, there has been *Chicken Soup For The Soul*; among Campbell's most prominent slogans over the years are "Mmm Mmm Good" and "Never Underestimate The Power Of Soup" and we all know that Chicken Soup *IS* Jewish Penicillin.

However, unfortunately, all of those positive chicken soup facets, and many more, were not enough for a wide array of past participants of our Temple Beth Sholom Chicken Soup Cook-Off, to overcome all of the heartache and despair compounded over the last four years.

While there were some restaurants and stores who were going to be able to be a part of this year's event; after I heard, face-to-face, the trials and tribulations of many others, it became apparent that it was in the best interest of all concerned to postpone "Soup" er Bowl V until next year.

Next Year.

Next Year in Jerusalem---L'Shana Haba'ah B'Yerushaliam--the song that is chanted at the end of the Passover Seder and the Ne'ila Service on Yom Kippur is seemingly so appropriate as I am authoring this piece one week out from the most heinous attack on Israel and the Jewish people since the Holocaust. For next year may we all be together in Jerusalem---in Israel.

Yet, watching the endless hours of news coverage, and seeing more than 360,000 reservists called into defending Israel, it makes one fearful of what could be; but makes one prideful of every one of the 360,000, of Israel and of being Jewish.

Take the time to think of what being Jewish means to you. It can be spiritual. It can be religious. It can be for the traditions. It can be for what it has represented in your lifetime. It can be the sacrifices made by others, the joys experienced, the beliefs shared.

Personally, I think of the holiday gatherings with family and friends when our home's festive festival table ran from the dining room around the living room. I think of my life with my friends in Hebrew School and at New Hampshire's Camp Tevya; which is the same camp attended by my mother and my sister. I think of my father and all he did for our synagogue, Temple Beth Am, while I was growing up; and that I have proudly followed in his footsteps participating here at TBS. I think of the antisemitism I experienced growing up, and 50-plus years later it is still here. I think of Renee's father and his family in the Holocaust; and that he, his brother and father actually survived the atrocities. I think of Renee's relatives living in Israel, including a 23 year-old cousin—a young lady--who is not one of the 360,000 reservists; but now is her time serving in Israel's Army.

I think of the delectable Jewish foods---and, as I close my eyes, in my mind I smell and taste the chicken soup of my mother's mother, my father's mother, my mother, and now my wife.

Never underestimate the power of soup.

And, more importantly, Never Underestimate The Power Of Being Jewish. For next year is now.




