From the Rabbi's desk

Shalom,

We usher the month of September in with Labor Day. Many of us have finished vacationing; the school year begins again. The Jewish calendar almost coincides with September—Rosh Chodesh Elul (the 1st of Elul) falls on September 3-4. This is the month that precedes the Jewish New Year, which occurs on the first of Tishrei. Because we are in a leap year on the Jewish calendar, the High Holidays fall late (do they ever fall on time? (a) —all in October, and I can't remember the last time that this occurred.

Traditionally, Elul is the month that we begin to prepare ourselves for the *Yamim Noraim*, the Days of Awe. Our Tuesday evening Healing Service will fall on Rosh Chodesh Elul, and we will mark the occasion with the blowing of the shofar. Rosh Hashanah is not the only time we blow the shofar—every day during the month of Elul it is blown to awaken us, to remind us that we must get ready.

This is the time that we begin asking for forgiveness and to start the atonement process. As we look inward, and try to make peace with our own families, friends and each other, I also ask that we pray for peace in the world, in Israel and for the return of the hostages. As Alden Solovy writes:

You who makes peace in the highest heavens, Guide our hearts and our hands In service to each other and Your world.



As it is September, we are gearing up for this year's High Holy Days. Last year in my September article I mentioned that the High Holy Days were right on time, but this year they are not until October, so they are late!!

Nonetheless, we are all eager to see everyone at Friday night Shabbat Services. I hope that you will be joining us in the sanctuary, as we gather and truly feel the love of your Temple Family. Of course, through the wonders of technology, we will also have our services via Zoom!

My family and I have much to be thankful for, as I believe we all do!

This year takes on a more somber note as antisemitism is probably worse than it's ever been since what occurred in Germany pre and during WWII. Our hearts are broken with the fact that there are still many hostages being held by Hamas. We must persevere and do our best to show up, be counted and be proud.

While I feel like a broken record when I say this, we must all remember that supporting a synagogue is a mitzvah and can be done in many ways: volunteering, financially, and of course spiritually.

With all that is going on in our community as well as the world around us, we MUST show up in larger numbers than ever before! Please think about joining our Volunteer Security Team as Past President David Chenkin has written about in this issue of The Voice.

And, as I have previously remarked, synagogues are extensions of our homes where Jewish life is marked and celebrated; a place where ethics are upheld, and love and kindness prevail. Synagogues bring families together to honor sacred time.

We cannot hide the fact that synagogues cost money to run. Staff and infrastructure all cost money, and all are necessary to support Jewish life. Without membership dues, tuition from religious schools, and donations we simply would not exist. It is our job to support the ongoing expenses of synagogues and not to wash one's own hands of the obligation.

I believe in this adage, so I am repeating myself: Rabbi Hillel taught, "Do not separate yourself from the community" (*Pirke Avot* 2:5). He reminded us that each is responsible for our community.

We need everyone's commitment to step up when needed, in the form of time, money, energy, and emotional investment. Ideally, what one gets out of belonging to a synagogue is measured in feelings of love, community, and connection to each other and to the Divine (or to something greater than ourselves).

#### July & August Board of Trustees Meetings

The Board of Trustees met briefly on Monday July 8, via Zoom, to focus on a few important items pertaining to the building. President Joy Bobrow reviewed important building safety requirements so that those who work in the building are always aware of who has gained entrance to the building. Sanctuary window repair, concrete/brick work in the playground, and entry door latch have all been completed. After discussion, the Board agreed to engage with a local funeral director who requested limited use of our space. Sisterhood President Barbara Gandelman thanked the Board and Temple family for all the support given last month upon the passing of Adam's mother. Jim Kettig, House Committee Chair, reported the work on the cooling and heating system will proceed.

The Board of Trustees met on Monday August 19, via Zoom. President Joy Bobrow reported on the new computers and thanked Walter Costanza for his work on them. Summer Shabbat Services have been wonderful thanks to lay leaders. She thanked Past President David Chenkin for assuming leadership on creating a Temple Volunteer Security Team. She reminded all to make reservations for the upcoming Open House. July minutes were approved as presented.

Financial Secretary Robin Myers reported we now have 111 member units. Treasurer Charlene Metz reviewed the financial report which was approved by the Board as presented.

Rabbi Sharon Ballan reported it was a particular pleasure to have the recent Bar/Bat Mitzvah students lead this Summer's Shabbat Services. Healing Services are resuming. She and Cantor Korobow are starting to plan High Holiday Services. Cantor Jerry Korobow sent a report that he is looking forward to another excellent TBS season.

Pulpit and Ritual Committee Chair Geri Weiss thanked all the summer lay leaders and especially Matthew Cohen and Walter Lothammer who led the Religious School Students, and Dara Bernstein, who led the Shabbat Service on August 16. Rabbi Ballan has presented a new and shorter Prayer for Israel, which we will start reciting when services resume in September. We are in touch with other congregations to join for a Selichot Service/Program which will be on Saturday, September 28. Joe deLeon and Fay Schildkraut will present on the Jews of Jamaica during the interim program on Yom Kippur this year.

Elaine Larkin, Parents Association Co-President, reported on hosting a welcome back breakfast on Sunday morning, September 8. She spoke of upcoming fall meetings and events, and talked about the Religious School Board Meeting and the schedule and plans for the 2024-25 school year, including High Holiday plans. The school hopes to reconnect with the Israeli school with which they had previously established a pen pal program.

Lori Lustig, Membership Committee Chair, reported she has been in touch with three families interested in the Religious School, as well as on plans for the upcoming Open House.

Sisterhood President Barbara Gandelman submitted her report and thanked all who attended, organized, and ran the August 8 auction. Hybrid Bingo is planned for September as well as a Challah-making program.

President Joy Bobrow reported on the Use of Building and said that the Oratorio Society will be returning on Monday evenings and Kevin Wandy, Funeral Director, will be periodically using the space outside of the sanctuary.

Jim Kettig, House Committee Chair, updated the Board on the HVAC replacement/repair project. We have a contractor, and serious negotiations are in progress. The costs for asbestos removal, heating, and air conditioning portions of the project have been analyzed and they are considering a phased approach to the project so that we are not left without money to pay for potential cost overruns. We must do the air conditioning aspect first and possibly put off the boiler repair until the spring.

Andrew Larkin, Men's Club Chair, reported bowling is on hold for now. He reported on the summer events.

Deirdre Weliky, Caring Committee Chair, submitted report on supports that the committee has offered in the past month. The Adult Discussion Group will meet on September 11 via Zoom.

President Bobrow reported the next food pantry is on August 20, and reported on continued work for Bazaar.

Barry Packer, Ways and Means Committee Chair, updated the Board on plans for the  $75^{th}$  Anniversary Gala in May.

Eric Bernstein, Adult Education Committee Chair, reported on the upcoming program scheduled for Sunday, September 15. Future events will include Defensive Driving class.

Past President David Chenkin presented plan to initiate a volunteer Security Team to address increases in antisemitic attacks on Temples. He has reached out to Community Security Services (CSS) and TBS members will receive an e-blast with link to their introductory Zoom session ("Entry Point") on Wednesday evening, August 28 on how to improve security and be aware of potential threats. He would like between six and eight volunteer Temple Members to continue training as part of an ongoing security team to be "greeters or ushers" at Temple Services. Training will be both in-person and virtual and will be provided by CSS free of charge. He plans to coordinate with the 109th Precinct Community Affairs Unit. Good news was shared by Board members and the meeting was adjourned at 9:20 pm.

Because of the recent trend of threats against Jewish communities and institutions, I have decided to start an all-volunteer security team for Temple Beth Sholom. I have been in contact with a group called Community Security Services (CSS) and they will provide training to the Temple free of charge. We have already participated in the first step an hour-long Zoom meeting called Entry-Point. Since I wrote this prior to that meeting, hopefully many of you took part in it.

The next step is either a Zoom or in-person training session called Ushers/Greeters, which trains people on how to recognize potential human threats. With the High Holidays coming up I am looking for six to eight volunteers to participate in that training. Following that is the next level of training called CSS Synagogue, which provides higher level of training when encountering actual security events. This involves up to four hours online and a three-hour in-person session. The goal is to have one member of the team at Temple during Shabbat Services and at least two members during larger Temple events.
