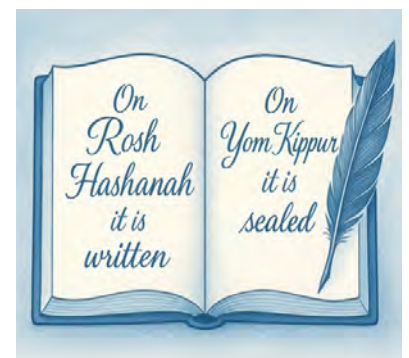

July & August Board of Trustees Meetings

The Board of Trustees met July 13 and August 10, 2026. The June and the July meeting minutes were approved.

The Board discussed various options to provide non-Temple members with Temple news and information. At this time information will continue to be provided by the office when requested.

Robin Myers, Financial Secretary, reported as of July 31, we have 110 member units. Dues statements will be mailed out in early August to any member who is not on a payment plan. Treasurer Charlene Metz reviewed the June and July Financial Reports, which were approved by the Board as presented.

Rabbi Sharon Ballan reported preparations are underway for the High Holy Days. In addition, attention is being directed at the resumption of the weekly and monthly activities that had been suspended during the summer. Lori Lustig, Membership Committee Chair, reported a Meet & Greet is planned for August 28 at 6:30 pm, with light snacks followed by service and Oneg. There will also be an enhanced Oneg at the Pizza in the Hut Sukkot Service so that prospective members can meet the Cantor.

Geri Weiss, Pulpit & Ritual Committee Chair, reported on High Holiday preparations and thoughts for the New Year.

Elaine Larkin, Religious School Board member, reported that the Board met to plan dates for the 2026-2027 calendar year. They have discussed having post confirmation students lead the High Holy Days Children Services. Religious School and Jewish Start begin Sunday, September 20 at 10:00 am and 10:30 am respectively. Hebrew school begins Wednesday, September 16 at 4:30 pm. Elaine welcomed Parents Association new P.A. President Marla Tolson and reported they have met to plan special events and Parents Association Board Meetings for the 2026-2027 calendar year. The next P.A. meeting and Welcome Back Breakfast will be on Sunday morning, September 20 at 10:00 am. Pizza in the Hut will be Friday, September 25 at 6:00pm.

Barbara Gandelman, Sisterhood President, reported on the July Book Club and August Auction. The next book club will read and discuss "Boys From the Bronx" with Adult Education in November.

Jim Kettig, House Committee Chair, reported they expect the air conditioning problems in the Sanctuary should be rectified before the High Holidays. The Security contractor completed work on a new gate at service dock. They are starting work on parking lot lighting and should be addressing doors and windows. The bollards have been successfully installed at the entrance.

Eric Bernstein, Men's Club Representative, reported on the July Fishing Trip and the upcoming August L.I. Ducks baseball game. He reported that he, Eric Lustig and Andrew Larkin attended a meeting of the Men of Reform Judaism. Bowling will continue in the fall.

Deirdre Weliky, Caring Committee Chair, reported July was a very quiet month. The Adult Discussion Group will meet on Zoom on Wednesday, September 9 at 7:30 pm. The subject will be Antisemitism: Then and Now, There and Here. The July Food Pantry was on July 21 and the August date is August 18.

Gail Tishcoff reported the next TBS Blood Drive is Sunday, November 22 but urged anyone who can donate to do so now since there is a critical city-wide need for all blood types. She plans to meet, in September, volunteers who work the FJCC Food Pantry and that Karen Halper, from the FJCC, said they are willing to volunteer at the Blood Drive and serve as Chinese language interpreters.

Past President David Chenkin, Security Team, reported the team met to discuss issues presented at the recent CSS Academy class he attended in June. Issues include composition of the security kit, performance of preparatory drills using various scenarios, and assigning weekly shifts to perform building exterior sweeps during the week. He welcomed Amy Edelstein as our latest addition to the team.

Barry Packer, Ways & Means Committee Chair, reported on progress with the October 17 Chicken Soup Cook-Off, including judges, vendor participants, and Beth Dulberg's flyer and banner design. He requested volunteers please let him know availability.

Eric Bernstein, Adult Education Committee Chair, reported that Adult Ed will have a hybrid/blended event with Sisterhood and Men's Club on Sunday, November 22 at 10:00 am featuring an interview with Eric Reisman, author of the "Boys from the Bronx". Good and Welfare was shared.

There will be a new event – Nosh & Play, on Thursday, October 15 at 6:00 pm. Look for the flyer to sign up. We are hoping to see you there!

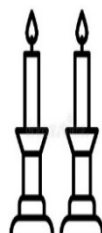

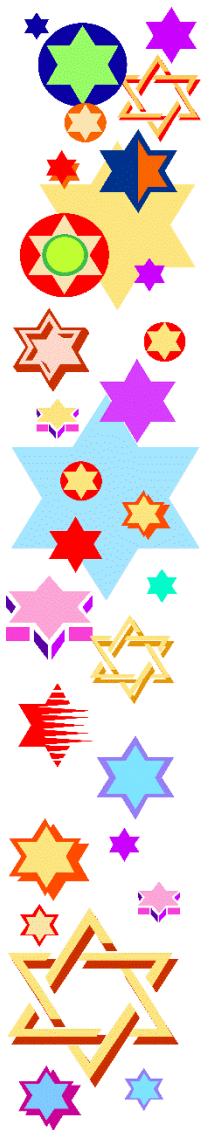

We also have celebrity judges who, in the past have included culinary aficionados and politicians, journalists and dignitaries. And, as a group, they cast their ballots for awards that are separate from the public's decision of the victors.

The soups are not just what you may imagine as one that you can remember of the aroma wafting through bubbe and zayde's home on Shabbat, the holidays or any Wednesday on the calendar. In the past, we have had Kosher and Greek, Italian and Caribbean, diner fare and even a pharmacy---yes, Jewish Penicillin.

A variety of the vendors will not limit their donations to soup; some have also included culinary samplings such as matzah balls and potato latkes, macaroni and cheese and pizza. There are also donations of bagels from our friend Jeff at The Bagel Shoppe; and ice cream stores have donated their frozen treats.

Of course, there are raffle prizes for assorted gifts including hotel stays---both on Long Island and Cape Cod--and gift certificates to a variety of restaurants and stores. As a team, we are still in the middle of bringing our competitors on board. But, as of this writing, know that your featured competitors include Bayside Milk Farm, Ben's Kosher Deli, Mythos, Bourbon Street, Cascarino's, Cornerstone, Durso's, Fontana, and Uncle Bacala. Included in your gift certificate donors are Holiday Inn Holtsville, IHOP, Jimmy's Trattoria, La Baraka, Marbella, Marino's, Top Mast Resort and Young's Farm.
